## Principal's Message



Dear Parents/Guardians:

Thank you for taking some time to read and learn of the many great things happening at Crescent Town! Firstly, we want to congratulate the students who were recognized at this month's school assembly for demonstrating Empathy. You were selected by your teacher and/or peers for being leaders and Ms. Myrvold and I are extremely proud of you.

The daily supervision and safety of students is of paramount importance to us and thus we were extremely pleased to receive additional staff allocation for the Grade 1 to 4 Lunch Program. With a large volume of students both in the lunchroom and outside, this is welcomed news. With four staff now in place for our Grade 1 to 4 program, as well as our

teaching staff on duty, we are hopeful this will limit incidents/injuries on the school yard and promote enhanced safety for all.

Our teachers have been hard at work collaborating with one another through job embedded professional learning in Mathematics. With the leadership of our Teaching and Learning Coach, Denise Colby, staff have been Co-Teaching various math lessons and exploring student voice. This is an opportunity for staff to learn from one another with the students at the center of each lesson.

Mrs. Myrvold and I want to commend our staff on their commitment to students as we continuously refine our practices of effective instruction of Mathematics.

With many key school board and community partners on site, we were able to conduct a thorough walk through of the site recently to address ongoing construction work. This enabled us to review work at the site as well as explore options in addressing safety concerns raised by various members of school staff and the parent community. We also put forth some concerns directly from our students in regards to issues of play on the school yard. Some concerns brought forth by the various stakeholders included: large gaps between stone steps, risk of injury on hill and forest area, lack of sightlines for supervision in forest area, long standing work orders to remove dead trees, lack of shade in FDK yard and enhanced play opportunities for students (e.g. age appropriate slide for FDK, climbing apparatus, basketball nets for Gr. 1-4 students).

In the recent weeks, you may have noticed the removal of dead trees making the forest area visible and open for outdoor play. This will be closed during winter weather conditions. The stone steps on the hill have been fenced off for safety reasons and in response to concerns from various stakeholders. Portions of the hill will also be closed off during winter weather conditions. We are in the process of finalizing a partnership with Access Alliance which will enable us to utilize \$16,000 for further planting/greening initiatives on the hill, upper and lower pavement areas. A basketball nets will be placed on the lower pavement in response to our Junior Students' requests.

The Kindergarten yard was designed as it is to ensure our school becomes an accessible site. As a result this limits large structures/slides/climbing apparatus from being installed. Cost, maintenance and work order backlog was also taken into account by the school board in exploring more naturalized play opportunities as well as our current partnership with Earth Day. We greatly appreciate your feedback and suggestions to our ongoing efforts both inside and outside the building and we will continue collaborating with you as our partners.

Thank you to the many parents who were able to attend the School Council Meeting on November 23rd. The council this year is full of renewed energy and a new executive team including Chair Beth Gebreab, Co-Chair Rejwan Karim and Treasurer Rashida Ibrahim. I look forward to collaborating with the council as we try to further enhance the learning experiences for our students. To support ongoing communication, we will be sharing with the Council Chair, updated parent emails on file from student registrations. This will enable our Council Chair to contact you directly for important news, updates and information for parents/guardians. 


## November is Indigenous Education Month

# Coffee, Tea and Conversation: Writing Workshop for Parents

Thanks to all the parents who came to our second Coffee, Tea and Conversation to support your child's writing at home. During the workshop we shared ideas and strategies about writing.. We believe families are composed of individuals who are competent and capable, curious, and rich in experience. Families love their children and want the best for them. Families are experts on their children. They are the most powerful influence on children's learning, development, health and well-being. (The Kindergarten Program 2016)

Some key strategies we discussed are:

- Writing your World View: Students need opportunities to discuss how their knowledge, experiences, and perspectives influence the texts they compose.
- Students need time to share and discuss their experiences before, during, and after writing.
- Students need authentic purposes, audiences, and forms for writing. Some examples include: writing letters to each other, grocery lists, lists of games to play together, writing reminders together, creating a family calendar, or creating alphabet books.
