Script: I am [calling/writing] in support of Noela Kah Sala (A# 215-945-106), who has been detained for 2 years. Noela fled violence in Cameroon and trekked 8 countries to reach the U.S. Noela has been detained in 5 facilities, including Irwin County, and now Montgomery Processing Center. Since her detention at Irwin, Noela has had a series of worsening gynecological issues. After hearing that a doctor at Irwin performed non-consensual surgeries on the women detained there, Noela is terrified that she could have been sterilized. She is particularly vulnerable to COVID-19, as she has high blood pressure, and was given an untreated Hepatitis B diagnosis. I demand that Noela is released on humanitarian grounds, and reunited with her young son, who is waiting for her in Oakland, CA.

Script: *My name is [name]. I am [calling/writing] in support of Noela Kah Sala (A# 215-945-106), who has been detained for two years. Noela was first at Fort Isabelle and El Valle for a year, then at Irwin County Detention Center in GA, where she complained of medical negligence and was possibly sterilized. Then she was transferred to Joe Corley Detention Center, and since August she has been detained at Montgomery Processing Center in Conroe, TX. Noela has a young son who is currently living in Oakland, CA. I'm [calling/writing] your office to ask for your help in securing her release.*

Noela grew up in Mbengwi, in Northwest Region of Cameroon, where she worked as an elementary school teacher until police came and tortured her and her grandmother (who they killed) for speaking out against the authoritarian regime of the government. She fled 5 armed conflicts in Cameroon in June 2018, and trekked on foot from Ecuador to the U.S., where she arrived in September 2018.

Noela has been dealing with medical conditions throughout her time in detention. Since her detention at Irwin, she has had a series of worsening gynecological issues. After hearing news of a doctor at Irwin [performing non-consensual surgeries on the women detained there](#), Noela is terrified that she could have been sterilized while detained there.. In addition, Noela is particularly vulnerable to COVID-19, as she has had high blood pressure since December 2019, and was given an untreated Hepatitis B diagnosis.

In addition to Noela's son, who is eagerly awaiting her release, Noela also has loving family on the East Coast who is ready to support her. She is a devout Pentecostal who cannot wait to join vibrant Church communities in the U.S.

I urge you to help in securing the release of Noela Kah Sala.
