

## European Flag Thinglink

Using the Thinglink app, tell the story behind your European country's flag. What do the colors and design represent? Be sure to include touch points on the appropriate locations on the flag to describe the meaning behind them.

You will also need to grade your flag on the NAVA flag standards that we have been using. See the table below to review them. Include a touchpoint that grades the flag on these

standards. Be sure to give the flag an overall grade as well.

Category	Descriptor
Keep it simple	The flag should be so simple that a child can draw it from memory.
Use Meaningful Symbolism	The flag's images, colors, or patterns should relate to what it symbolizes.
Use 2-3 colors from the standard color set.	Limit the number of colors on the flag to three, which contrast well and come from the standard color set: red, white, blue, green, yellow, and black.
No Lettering or Seals	Never use writing of any kind or an organization's seal.
Be distinctive or related	Avoid duplicating other flags, but use similarities to show connections.
Visibility from a distance	Flag can be clearly displayed on a 1" x 1 ½" piece of paper.
