# Confirmation Class Schedule 2025/26 (7th & 8th Grades) Year B

## Purpose:

The purpose of this two-year sequence is to prepare our kids for confirmation in the Episcopal Church and help them take ownership of their faith and the vows made for them at their baptism.

## Structure:

The class follows a 2-year cycle, with kids learning Holy Scripture (Year A) and the Church's tradition, history, and Christian ethics (Year B). Students may begin with Year A or Year B, depending on when they begin the confirmation process.

## **Some Essential Questions:**

What does it mean to be a Christian? An Episcopalian? What is the Church, and what does it mean to me? How has my faith changed in my life so far; how may it still change? Who is Jesus to me? What does it mean to take ownership of my faith?

## Logistics:

- Classes will be taught by Mother Storm and Mother Eliza
- Classes follow school schedules--i.e. No classes on school holidays
- All classes go from 5:30-6:30 pm. Please be on time.
- Other requirements, such as worship attendance and participation, will be shared when classes begin.
- Only 8th graders need to have a sponsor. This will be explained when classes begin.
- All confirmation kids will be expected to volunteer in one of the four following areas: Sunday reader in services, Sunday acolyte in services, Sunday greeter, or member of the Junior Altar Guild. Sign-ups for these ministries will happen in the fall, before classes begin.
- Confirmation students are also encouraged (but not required) to put their faith into action at one of our feeding ministries: Midnight Run or the Fordham Food Pantry.

## To buy/bring to class (IMPORTANT!)

Please buy your child a Book of Common Prayer in time for the first class on November 2. NOTE: This will become the book that the bishop signs when your child is confirmed. You may purchase a basic edition (totally fine) <a href="here">here</a>, or a leather-bound gift edition <a href="here">here</a>.

Also buy this book, *My Faith*, *My Life* which we'll be using and referring to a lot, and this book, "What If Jesus Was Serious?" which we'll use to open class (they'll also be using this book with their sponsors starting in January)

## **Sponsors**

Every 8th grader will need a sponsor, someone in the parish or close to your child (preferably outside the family, though) who can meet with them four times, starting in January and before confirmation.

Your child will need to have chosen their sponsor by class on January.

Attendance at all classes is expected to qualify for confirmation.
