

Shakespeare Unit

Title of Unit: Shakespeare

Enduring Understandings

- In this unit, students will be asked to annotate and analyze a full Shakespeare play, complete graphic organizers, answer multiple-choice reading comprehension questions, and respond utilizing short-paragraph responses.
- The purpose of the unit is to acclimate students with the type of writing that will be expected on the Part 2 of the Regents exam.

Essential Questions

- How can I be an active viewer of a dramatic production?
- How can I understand and analyze this genre's characteristics and structure (as opposed to prose)?
- What strategies can I use to determine the best piece of evidence?
- How can I analyze each piece of evidence to best argue my point?
- How can I utilize language skills to determine how to create a precise claim?
- How can I utilize text evidence from various stages in the play to best support my claim?
- How do I properly format and organize an argumentative response?

Guiding Questions

- How do I narrow down text evidence from the play to find the best examples?
- Where in the text can I go to find the evidence to argue my point?
- What steps should I take in order to successfully organize an argumentative response?
- What can I infer from the evidence I collected?
- How does knowing the genre and its characteristics affect the readers' expectations?
- How does knowing historical context and production affect the readers' understanding of a Shakespearean drama?
- How do directors' choices influence how viewers perceive characters and plot?

Knowledge

- Use text evidence from the novel to prove claims
- Analyze an author's and/or director's intent and point of view
- Evaluate the author's use of literary elements and devices within the play.

Skills

- Read the play closely.
- Interpret words and phrases as they are used in the play: connotative and figurative meanings.
- Analyze the play using knowledge of literary elements and devices—with special attention to directors' choices.
- Draw evidence from the play to support precise claims.
- Accurately use general academic and content-specific words and phrases sufficient for reading, writing, and viewing.
- Properly frame a text-based response.
