Grading Policies

All of the activities and lessons we do are intended to build your content understanding, historical thinking skills, and **community engagement** (think of this as 'being better people' skills that we will develop and includes things like being able to have an informed conversation with peers, understanding power dynamics, being a team member, finding the root causes of issues, brainstorm strategies for changing the world, etc.)
