# **Learning Outcomes:**

It's necessary that we read diligently at the beginning of the term to understand forms and blending/bending. This will require that you immediately look closely at all the books we'll be reading in the course.

Our specific goal during the first part of the course is to have an intelligent and informed conversation about the books we are reading together. To accomplish this, of course, we must all come to class prepared, and we must all be willing to bring our knowledge, intellect, and experience to the conversation. We want to hear from everyone in class! Our discussion in class should be informed by the analytical and critical tools we've learned throughout our ENGL/WR studies.

Our specific goal during the second part of the class is to decide upon the genre, subject, scope, and treatment for our individual capstone projects and to complete the compilation of the research that will inform the writing of the capstone. To this end, we will compile an extensive, sound, and appropriate annotated working bibliography for our individual capstone projects.

The objective of our critical discussions and writing in ENGL/WR 401 is to build an informed intellectual framework in which to work as creative and critical thinkers engaged in a productive cultural enterprise. This common core of reading will serve as an important springboard when we begin the workshop/critique process of responding to our capstone drafts winter term.

The objective of our most tangible effort—the research that will serve to inform our capstones--will serve to help us draft a substantial body of important work that demonstrates a clear writing process and our skills as writers and thinkers. Whatever approach we choose, the objective is to produce work that may be seriously considered for publication in *Oregon East* or elsewhere.

### **Course Requirements:**

The requirements for ENGL/WR 401 include careful completion of all reading assignments and discussions, an annotated working bibliography for your capstone project, short critical pieces based on the readings, reading quizzes and exams, attending two Ars Poetica readings and/or the Oregon East Gala, and having fun.

- critical essays, writing assignments (30-70 pts)
- reading quizzes (30-50 pts)
- reading exams (50-100 pts)
- annotated working bibliography (200 points)
- attending Ars Poetica readings and one-page typed responses (30 pts x 2)

#### **Brief Outline of Course:**

ENGL/WR 401 is conceived as an opportunity for students from our various tracks to work together toward an intellectual and creative synthesis of academic work. The intention that shaped the form of our English education is that we would first share a unified common core of knowledge, study a specific set of courses within a chosen track, and then complete our education with a course in which literary analysis and literary creation are purposely reunited.

In ENGL/WR 401, that synthesis calls upon the tools of the English/Writing student to create an analytical work or a creative work that explores and crosses the boundaries of traditional genres. Your own writing will blur, blend, and bend genres and distinctions between the critical and the creative.

During the first part of the course, we will read works that explore form, nuance, history, and biography, as well as works that blend the graphic and multi-genre memoir and journalism. Each of the readings uses formal as well as innovative elements to detail, lampoon, and explore the boundaries of family, history, love, and loss. The belief is that these books will suggest to you the possibilities for your own approach to writing imaginatively and persuasively across genres in your capstone.
