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This reading group focuses on justice, bias and fairness concerns in AI from a wide range of disciplinary perspectives—including CS, law, philosophy, and STS. The group is open to anyone interested, regardless of whether bias/fairness is your primary research focus. We meet every week. Sessions take a variety of formats, including book club discussions, presentations of work in progress/recent work by members, presentations of papers in the research area or series of papers on a theme, and guest speakers.
