Kelly MAAC has done work on Wheelchair Taxis - looking at oversight for the program

- Received \$500,000 to improve service, increase wheelchair taxis and
- June 1: A pilot program has been created to use them until September 30th, and the budget will continue throughout the year. Anyone can use visitors of DC
- Special number to call (Not discounted fair program, same as regular taxi price) 3 grantees cab companies 24 total new vehicles accessible via phone and has multiple options for users.
- Number is 202-977-4928 to call and use the program,

 <u>Curbside Management Discussion(Need level playing field for everybody in DC)</u>
- Intersection of 4th and Virginia Ave NW Example of Illegal Sign Placement
- Approaching from the sidewalk, the sightline is blocked
- wheelchair users impedes view, close to sidewalk
- Some pedestrians cannot be seen, deadly consequences, example of boy in NY and was killed by NYPD tow-truck
- Sightline laws are already in the MAAC Responses lots of examples in DC
- Documents sent to DDOT Director Questions (Send to Lizzy)
- Remedy for highlighting the issues traffic safety input requests in 311 but there is a problem - only committed to doing 200 per quarter, would not get attention for years if there are so many requests - would like to think of a solution to this problem
- Process what happens if MAAC passes resolutions Naming problems that need solutions noting that is a problem that needs to be fixed
- Vending trucks along the mall crosswalks that have tons of people and flagrant violations of vending trucks - bring in department of health to fix that problem - there is an office to looking at other problems for other issues - they block crosswalks and signs with high density areas of pedestrians - and also for persons with disabilities. place to do a pilot or some test of what could be done
- include MPS in the resolution many roads are controlled by the national park service
- Priority issue for curbside management and deciding by which problems are the most important to get through
- What is the best way to approach the information
- City Council and Health Department need to work together to get information pushed the right way
- Protected Bike Lanes vs allowing pedestrians to cross
- ADA compliance for modal hierarchy Overview
- Connecticut/ U Street bike lanes that have their own light to follow
 - Ongoing problem

- With no protected bike lanes others go into the lanes accidents, and more scooters end on on sidewalks that interject. Makes using sidewalk not as well and dangerous if there is a bike/scooter rider
- Bike lane concerns yielding or if they intersect at all some areas have more
- Policy intersection of proper protocol
- Enforcement is tough
- Policy conflict is that bicycles are not using signals in the way that cars do. Bikes are creating serious hazards
- Prioritization of bikes in dc lobbying impact

List of Items to Address with DDOT

- Requesting DDOT consult us on all capital projects >1M
 - Connecticut Avenue DDOT proposal Expanding DC lanes, 26 million project vs
 14 million project budget for sidewalks
 - o Quick, Medium, and Capital Projects main goal to request for capital projects
 - Bus Lanes are the best use of lanes (equity, sustainability, etc)
- Asking DDOT to follow a Modal Hierarchy
 - For all streets, focus on sidewalks on all sides of street, then transit focus and so on
 - Curb Access Limitations with Bike Lanes and Pickup/Drop-off Lanes for persons with disabilities
- Asking DDOT to do a Sightline Audit Citywide and put Action Plan to bring DC into compliance with regs
 - Request curbside management to plan with the council
- Asking DDOt to evaluate banning left turns in high volume areas
- Mandate design speed reductions on high injury corridors/arterial road
 - o disproportionate amount of fatalities in those areas, speed is the way to do it
- Asking Council to impose residency requirements and/or eliminate parking at DDOT until DDOT TDM survey shows out of state drive-alone is below 5%
- Mapping density against key equity indicators
 - Poorest areas of DC have the worst infrastructure for people with disabilities
 - Would inform decision making for the council
 - Create a tool to view this information
- Sidewalks
- Lack of bubble mirrors for where sidewalks intersect with drives, alleyways
 - o In order to stop and get visibility, makes it difficult to see if the path is clear
- Scrambled Sidewalks traffic and pedestrians Branes Dance Sidewalks, Columbia Heights Metro Station
 - The safest/efficient way for users to crosscut
- Lack of Curb Cuts in certain areas, sidewalks surfaces, cobblestones surrounding them
- Lyft does not have any accessibility users and Uber it is hard to use

- Increase cars that accompany persons with disabilities
- Timing is difficult- hours of vehicles that accompany
- Joint statement to make it more clear about the problem, create committees through DFHV
- Accessible Parking Spots
 - Advocating for a decent amount of spots and increasing the number of them. Red top meters - that are for people with disabilities or a handicapped license
- Lack of enforcement
 - USPS trucks being in bus lanes (Federal)
 - Blocking curb cuts
 - Blocked areas , double parking
 - Illegal stalling of vehicles , putting "hazards on "
- Information Sharing
 - Different than education of the topic
 - Make information accessible to more people
- Listing places where there are no curb cuts specifically (No current systematic routine, Ask DDOT to create a project for curbcuts
 - No citywide effort to map curb cuts
 - Has been a project PCI index, does not include curb cuts only includes gaps in the sidewalk- barriers, trip hazards, etc
