Working Group Guidelines

Work-in-progress (WIP) working groups will meet on Saturday, October 18th from 9:00 am - 11:15 am. During this time, attendees who were accepted for the WIPs should meet with their group to discuss WIP feedback. To support generative working group sessions, here are a few guidelines:

- Read drafts in advance of the Symposium! You can access them via your group's shared Google Drive folder (link shared via email).
- Connect with your WIP group before the symposium via email or on Friday to discuss where you'd like to meet for your feedback session on Saturday and any other logistics.
- Meet somewhere comfortable for your working group session. You can meet with your group in Pillsbury Hall, or you can meet offsite at a coffee shop, hotel lobby, or another agreed-upon location. For ideas, see the [RHM Symposium Map!](#)
- Set a timer to ensure each member of your working group gets equal time to discuss feedback on their WIP (30 - 40 minutes per person).
- Provide feedback verbally during your WIP meeting. You are also welcome to provide written notes; we leave this up to each working group.
- Remember that the purpose of the WIPs is to support the development of RHM projects. Feedback shared should be constructive and respectful. Consider the writer's questions or context (if they provided any) on their draft and target your feedback to their requests.
- Consider leaving time at the end of the WIP session or take 10-15 min. after for individual reflection and note-taking to help summarize and document the feedback you received.
- *Virtual working groups:* You are not limited to the scheduled working group time and can arrange your group's meeting when you would like. If your group is not in contact yet, we encourage you to take the initiative (See the email sent from rhmsymposium@gmail.com on September 4 for your group's email addresses).

Connecting to eduroam
