

Jyoti Nanda (she/her) is an Associate Professor of Law at Golden Gate University (GGU) School of Law where she teaches Criminal Law, Professional Responsibility, and Juvenile Law. Her academic writing seeks to address where the law fails to protect communities impacted by *mass incarceration* and *mass surveillance* at the intersection of gender, race, disability, education, and juvenile justice. Jyoti has written most recently on the adultification of girls of color in our criminal justice system, how race functions to ascribe and criminalize disability within the special education context in over-policed and over-surveilled schools, and juvenile probation. She is an active member of the Bar and has been selected by the American Bar Association (ABA) to serve as the Reporter for the forthcoming ABA Juvenile Justice National Standards, and her research and writing has been featured in national press in print, TV, and radio.

Prior to joining GGU Law in 2019, she taught at UCLA Law for 16 years where she founded and ran the Youth & Justice Clinic teaching law students how to represent youth assert their unmet education and disability rights in juvenile criminal cases. Jyoti began her career as a Skadden Fellow at the NAACP Legal Defense and Educational Fund, Inc. She was educated at Northwestern Law in the Children & Family Justice Center and in the Ethnic Studies and Rhetoric departments at U.C. Berkeley. Born in Nairobi, she is a proud immigrant and the daughter of parents who were refugees and immigrants from Pakistan/India and Kenya. Jyoti considers herself a scholar, teacher, and lawyer-activist.
