# More Ways To Build Peace


Peace can be built in a multitude of ways. Here are more ideas that didn't fit on the poster!

- Demand adherence to the values of freedom, justice, democracy, tolerance, solidarity, cooperation, pluralism, cultural diversity, dialogue and understanding at all levels of society and among nations.

This effort is organized in conjunction with the <u>International Day of Peace</u> (Sept 21) and <u>Campaign Nonviolence Action Days</u> (Sept 21-Oct 2).

September 21 will also be the start of the Maine Peace Education Initiative's collaborative yearlong effort to inspire Mainers' interest in learning how creating a culture of peace will allow human and economic resources now devoted to warfare to be used instead to improve the

well-being of all living things and their environment. For example, the Initiative is also coordinating a day-long presentation at the Common Ground Fair on peace on September 21st.
