

HOW TO PLAY TOP TRUMPS

Any number of people can play Top Trumps™ Psych edition

1. Shuffle and deal the cards face down.
2. Players pick up their cards, looking at their top cards only.
3. Player 1 (left of dealer) chooses and calls out their best stat (e.g. 'Ethics: 22').
4. The other players see if they can beat this stat (Highest number wins).
5. The card with the highest stat wins all of the top cards and adds them to the base of their pile.
6. The winner of the round chooses the stat for the next round.
7. The first player to get all of the cards wins!

You have been given one name, so you are creating one card, please use the template on the slide deck. The trick is to think about where your individual falls in terms of each score. For example, Freud. He will score high in impact because he is SUPER famous, the father of psychoanalysis, but will score very low on scientific method, as he was not a researcher or scientific in any way. At the bottom of your card, you will briefly and concisely give their “greatest hits” –essentially explaining your rationale for the scores you awarded. We will meet to discuss cards where you will defend the scores you chose for your individual and will argue with others about the scores they assigned.
