'Empty tomb' narratives

See bottom of table for a summary of elements distinctive to each of the NT accounts. *Mark* is in the first column as the earliest of the gospels, probably written shortly after 70 CE; the synoptics, *Matthew* and *Luke*, are grouped with *Mark*. The translated text of the NT gospels is taken from the NRSV; *Peter* is taken from Ehrman's translation (*Lost scriptures*, 2003), which is based on M. G. Mara's edition (1973).
