**Whose Native Land Am I On?**

For this Ethnoautobiography assignment, I want you to explore three places on <https://native-land.ca>, an interactive map that shows you the indigenous nations whose land you are on.

**Instructions:**

The **first place** I want you to look up is **where you currently live**.

The **second place** I want you to look up is where you, a parent, relative, or a friend was **born**. This should not be the same place you currently live, so be creative in what you pick!

The **third place** I want you to look up is a location you have **visited on vacation** or on some other kind of trip. This could be a place you visited for summer camp, a place where you attended a concert, or any kind of other place you have been that is not either of the first two places. Be creative in what you pick!

You will **complete the worksheet below** and also provide a **screenshot** of at least one of your findings from the maps you found.

**The purpose:**


We want to examine how complex indigenous identities and presences exist, and have existed, in places we have commonly visited and that we inhabit. This will help us expand our understanding of just how colonized our spaces are, and how much we have to learn about the traditional people of the lands we traverse and live on.

Complete the worksheet below, and provide information about what you have learned. Please do your best to type out the names of the nations accurately. Leaving off accents is fine as long as accurate spelling is retained.
