

Getting Started With Eight AI Tools

Changes in Google Search: For years, typing in a single word or phrase was enough to grant access to immediate and accurate results — untangling complex topics with agility never before seen. Now all of that is gone. Google search has thrown specificity completely out the window.

Google has competition: Apple working on a default search engine powered by Siri since 2020. Google pays \$20 billion a year to Apple to be default search on Apple devices. That could be nearing an end, too. Keep in mind that this could ding Google ad revenue, which hovers near \$278 billion.

1. Turn on Generative AI search in Google Search Labs: https://labs.google.com/search/install

Click the slider button so it's on and Generative AI search results will appear above regular search. You can turn it off to go back to standard search. Google is testing this search feature.

Google Sheets and Docs: Log-in to <u>Google Workspace</u> to test out features coming to Sheets, like "Help Me Organize" prompts, and Google Docs "Help Me Write" (good for outlining, not writing news articles).


2. ChatGPT for Google Chrome Plug-in. Install here: https://chrome.google.com/webstore/category/extensions

This will run ChatGPT results in the upper right corner of any Google.com search you run. (Works only on my desktop for now; available for Edge and Firefox)

Bing Chat Chrome Extension. Install here:

3. Custom Instructions for ChatGPT

You can tailor how ChatGPT responds to your prompts. To get started, click on your account name in the lower left corner of the page. In the pop-up menu, select "Custom Instructions".

The dialog will ask you a couple of questions:

- 1. What would you like ChatGPT to know about you to provide better responses?
- 2. How would you like ChatGPT to respond?

How you answer (use a list) will help shape how GPT generates your answers. It can format answers in bullet points, cite sources and explain things to you as an expert or novice on the topic. You can ask it to format answers in HTML code or other languages.

Here's how I answered the questions, using a mix of seriousness and humor.

What would you like ChatGPT to know about you to provide better responses?

- -- I am a journalist, college professor and entrepreneur
- -- I am founder of Journalist's Toolbox AI and authored two books on journalism, "The Journalist's Toolbox" and "Data + Journalism"
- -- I founded the urban news and reporting site RedLineProject.news and use it to teach journalism students at UIC
- -- I know basic HTML and some other basic code
- I live in Chicago and love the Chicago Cubs

How would you like ChatGPT to respond?

- -- Respond to me as an expert on journalism, journalism technology and tools for journalists
- -- Treat me as an expert and academic when it comes to conversations about media, journalism, technology, sports and student media.
- -- Treat me like a novice when it comes to math, data analysis, statistics. Explain steps simply as I need that when I teach my students.
- -- Keep answers concise and include links to tools, research and web pages you cite information from
- -- When I ask for resources, make sure to cite links to the research or examples.
- -- Have fun with your responses, and respond to me in the tone of 1960s Batman. Use phrases like "Mike, good chum" and "Holy Hula Hoops, Mike" in your comments.

- -- Publish all headlines, subheads and other text in sentence type. Don't capitalize the first letter of each word unless it starts the headline or is a proper noun.
- -- If I ask you to summarize a passage, write it to an 8th-grade level.
- -- When relevant, break topics down to smaller, easy-to-understand parts. When editing text for me, list a bullet point list of all the changes at the end.
- -- Before beginning tasks, take a deep breath and perform step-by-step.
- -- Be clear, be brief and orderly in responses. Be direct and clear.
- -- Avoid opinions and try to be neutral.
- 4. Google Gemini (formerly Bard): https://gemini.google.com/ Just log-in with Google credentials and use it. Results have improved with upgrade to Gemini Ultra in 2024. Search is more current than ChatGPT, pro version costs \$20 a month with a free two-month trial.

Fact-checking: I sometimes use Gemini to fact-check photos. It can't always pinpoint the photo origins perfectly, but it can cast doubt as to whether the photo is real. Try it out on a few photos.

Fact-checking Gemini hallucinations in Google search. Step-by-step:

- 1. Open Gemini (free or paid) and enter your question or prompt.
- 2. Click the Google logo under Gemini's reply.
- Google checks Gemini's answer and marks the text according to what it finds.
 Green highlighted text means it found similar content. Orange highlight means it found different content.
- You can then click on the highlighted content to get the relevant link from Google's sources so that you can read more.

Set up an account on Discord first; then give MidJourney your Discord log-in credentials as you set up the MidJourney account. You'll build the prompts and images in Discord and then send the ones you want to keep/download to MidJourney. (Free but I pay \$10 monthly to MidJourney for some extra features).

8. Bing AI and Image Generator: https://www.microsoft.com/en-us/bing

Need to log-in through a Microsoft Edge browser with no privacy settings to get the chat to work. Combines Bing search and ChatGPT. Producing some interesting results so far.

You can experiment with the prompt a bit to add a footer, your credit, etc.

NOTE: You can change the chart type with a prompt like this:

Can you convert this data into an area chart?

2. Create a data dictionary

A data dictionary provides a detailed description of the dataset, which includes the meaning of each column, the type of the data, and any other relevant information. Let's make one with a simple data set:

Prompt: Can you make a data dictionary for this dataset: then paste the header and first 8-10 rows of data into ChatGPT or just upload the entire spreadsheet. Try it in ChatGPT, Gemini and Claude. (Gemini may produce some interesting results.)

3. Can LLMs write a decent FOIA letter? Let's take it for a spin ... https://gemini.google.com/app (log-in on a private browser window with your personal Gmail log-in, not tied to university accounts). Also try it on Claude and ChatGPT to compare outputs.

Start with this prompt, then try some others: Write a FOIA letter to the Environmental Protection agency's FOIA information officer asking for annual salaries of its five

highest-paid employees from 2017 through 2020. Write the letter in basic FOIA letter format and be specific on the name, address and email in the salutation. At the end, say in the salutation that the letter is from [Your Name], [Publication] [Contact info]

If Gemini is no good, try Claude.ai or ChatGPT

4. Train ChatGPT to Understand Your Needs

Note: These prompts won't produce perfect results every time. But use what you can, just as you wouldn't use everything from a Google search or other research, just use what you think works.

Role play with your prompts:

Give GPT, Gemini or Claude a role to play as it executes the prompt. It helps tailor the content to that person's or audience's needs. A few examples to get you going. Sub in your topics in th boldfaced areas.

I am a data journalist and need five links to to datasets on U.S. mass shootings. Please provide a short summary of the data and who produced it, followed by the links and any citations.

I am a data journalist and need five links to data-driven research on sports concussions. Please provide a short summary of the research followed by the links and any citations.

I am a data journalist and I need advice on how to combine two PDFs together into one document. Can you please walk me through the steps? List links to any tools or tips that can help me with this task.

You are a professor in #broadtopic. I need you to formulate some questions to ask someone to get them to think about #specifictopic. The questions should not be broad. The user needs to be able to easily give a specific answer. I need them to be asked in a way that helps them understand what #specifictopic actually is. Real-life examples need to be posed in the question

Here's one thing I tried: I have built an AI tools and resources website named JournalistsToobox.ai and need a description that will help me promote it.

Here are details about the product:

- More than 1.500 Al tools and resources
- Tools on data, image creation, video, ethics, guidelines

(Follow-up the prompt by asking it to write some tweets and viral hooks with hashtags for you to promote the site on a specific social channel).

Writing style:

Analyze the text below for style, voice, and tone. Create a prompt to write a new paragraph in the same style, voice, and tone: [insert your text]

Editing your work:

Edit the following text. It's for my [newsletter/paragraph/essay]. [paste text]

Memorization:

What are the most important facts, dates, or formulas related to (topic)? Help me create a memorization technique to remember them easily.

Learn from a mistake:

I made a mistake while practicing (skill). Can you explain what went wrong and how I can avoid making the same mistake in the future?

Simplify complex information:

Break down the (topic) into smaller, easier-to-understand parts. Use analogies and real-life examples to simplify the concept and make it more relatable.

Funny way to simplify:

Rewrite the [text] as if I was a 10-year-old

Summarize into bullet points:

Summarize this article into a bulleted list of the most important information [paste article]

Change writing style:

Change the writing style of the text below to [tone] [paste text] Use case: Easily make an informative paragraph humorous and easier to read.

Brainstorming:

Brainstorm 20 trending ideas for a Twitter thread on recent breaking Al news (or another topic)

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5. Some Google Gemini and Bing Chat business prompts to try:

Give me business headlines for [enter city here] for today

Give me news headlines from [enter city here] for today

*-Or recast as summaries. Are they accurate? Are there links and attribution? Is it RELIABLE? Note that Bing gives you links to the articles where Gemini and ChatGPT do not.

More prompts to try:

Summarize current events in US banking in simple words and in list form. Make a small conclusion at the end with the risks.

Give me the evolution of computer sales in the US since 2017 in a table and interpret the results.

Look at the news around rumors of upcoming Apple products and give me ideas for blog posts.

What is the naming format for pge.com emails?

For fun:

I'm visiting Detroit, Michigan next week. Name 5 lesser-known places that I absolutely must see.

Try this in Google and compare with ChatGPT for Google sidebar:

Michigan unemployment data 2010 to 2020

table template to create a bar graph of monthly unemployment statistics 2010 to 2020

The first will likely give you an estimate in GPT but good sourcing in Google (BLS, etc.) The second will give you a good table format in GPT but a bunch of bar graphs in Google. GPT is good for templates and prompts.

Use ScholarAI to summarize research on [enter city here] economic growth from 2010 to 2020

Now write that summary as a Twitter thread and provide 5 viral hooks and hashtags

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6. ScholarAl ChatGPT CustomGPT (also available as a plugin).

The tool pulls research from thousands of academic journals based on your prompts. It summarizes the research and provides links to the original documents, which is great for fact-checking. You can also have it rewrite the summaries into Twitter threads, slides, etc. Some prompts to practice with:

Use ScholarAI to summarize research on Nebraska economic growth from 2010 to 2022

Once you have the research, use this prompt:

Now write that summary as a Twitter thread and provide 5 viral hooks and hashtags

Use ScholarAI to summarize research on muscle growth in athletes that mentions gymnasts

Once you have the research, use this prompt:

Now write a twitter thread about it and give me five viral hooks and hashtags

Use ScholarAI to summarize research on redlining housing segregation new york city

Once it produces the results, which should include links to citations, enter this prompt:

Now write a Twitter thread about it and give me five viral hooks and hashtags

Now try the same exercise but with your own prompts and topics.

7. Wolfram Alpha ChatGPT plugin.

It will solve math problems and do some basic almanac research for you. Here are a few prompts to get you started:

- A. First, ask it: What can I do with the Wolfram Alpha plugin?
- B. Now ask it: What are examples of some prompts I can use with the Wolfram plugin?
- C. Now give it a multi-layered math problem:

If my ads earn a CPM rate of \$30 for every 1,000 unique opens, and I have 10,000 unique people minimum for each post, how much can I expect to earn from the posts if I have two ads on each post?

D. These are hit-and-miss, but give them a try:

How many over 60 live in Italy?

What is the gross domestic product of Guam over the past five years?

List the five cities in the world with the highest homicide rates

Now list the five lowest.

8. Whimsical ChatGPT Plug-in

Once installed, try a couple of prompts to get started:

Use Whimsical to create a diagram for me detailing a process by which a journalism story goes from raw idea to being a completed story that's accessible to the public

(Then hit the edit button at the bottom and you can edit the chart)

Create an organizational chart fo a student newsroom publication

May not work but try: Use Whimsical to create a diagram for Porter's five forces and include an extra area for environmental considerations.

9. Show Me Diagrams Plug-in

Try the Whimsical exercises until Mike thinks of something better. Lol.

10. Claude.ai (https://claude.ai/)

Allows you to upload documents and scan/analyze them. It can analyze a document up to 75,000 words and you can upload multiple documents.

Here's a prompt template to try (fill in the blanks and provide your own):

Summarize this writing and give me four actionable insights I can use as someone who [your profession here ... e.g. reports stories about the economy]

Then follow up with this prompt:

Can you give ma an explanation of	_ and how it might be relevant to me as a

Claude also is good with creating code. Here's a sample prompt to get you started.

Write the complete code for a login page in Flutter. The design must be responsive and modern.



Over the past year twenty other county workers also were suspected of defrauding the federal Paycheck Protection Program, accoring to interum Inspector General Steven Cyranoski. They include three high-ranking county officials, including one in the county's human resources office, a payroll supervisor in the comptroller's office & a director in the health department, according to Cyranoski.

In 5 quartrly reports since July 2022, Cyranoski said he & his investigators found county workers were sspected of stealing more than seven hundred thousand dollars in PPP money

12. Editing Tools

Use the basic toos below to edit and write headlines

<u>Headline Hero</u> (https://www.headlinehero.io/) is another free headline-writing tool for editors. It's simple interface lets you paste story copy and settings (length, keywords to include, type of headline, etc.) and it will generate some good headline options for you. I don't use this Al-driven tool all of the time, but it's an excellent option if you're stuck.

<u>Hemingway Editor (https://hemingwayapp.com/)</u>: Grades/evaluates your writing and flags passive voice, adjectives, adverbs and more.

QuillBot (https://quillbot.com/): An Al-driven editing tool that paraphrases writing.

Practice Story for the editing tools:

Long after the masks have come off and the lockdown orders lifted, low CTA ridership persists

In late March 2020, as most states issued stay-at-home-orders in response to the emerging COVID-19 crisis, Chicago was one of many cities seemingly desolated overnight. Workers not deemed essential stayed home, whether because they had the option of working remotely, or because their job had become a casualty of the pandemic.

Retailers, whether due to health concerns or anticipation of low demand, temporarily closed many locations, with some closures becoming permanent. Even parks and the lakefront were restricted to further discourage the public from breaking social distancing guidelines.

With nowhere to go, commuters acted accordingly. In a change widely hailed as a silver lining of the pandemic, traffic evaporated from many of America's roadways. As shown in the chart below, public transit demand in Chicago took a similarly large hit after the pandemic began.

Summarizing weekly totals of CTA ridership based on data provided by the Chicago Data Portal, the chart above illustrates just one dimension of the profound effect that the COVID-19 pandemic had on Chicago's public transit system. By the end of March 2020, total weekly demand dropped by over 75% from 8.8 million for the week ending March 7, 2020, to 2 million for the week ending March 28, 2020.

For those still commuting by CTA, though, reduced ridership also reduced safety, as violent crime reportedly doubled on the CTA rail system by the end of 2020. To make matters worse, the CTA experienced drastic service cuts as well, further degrading the experience of its commuters.

Three years after the first stay-at-home orders were issued, only half of Chicago's office workers had returned to the office, and the CTA continues to frustrate commuters with unreliable and unsafe transit options. The effect of these conditions is abundantly evident in the CTA's low ridership, which by March of 2023 inspires little hope of recovery to pre-pandemic volume.

A. Extract text from an image: Use this prompt and one of the text images (JPG or PNG) in our training folder to extract text with this prompt. Download the image from the folder and upload it into Gemini with the + sign button to the left of the prompt field. The prompt:

Perform OCR to extract the text from this image and put it into a text paragraph format

B.Image comprehension: Upload the image of thecar in this folder Use this prompt and both of the car images in the folder:

What is the year, make and model of the car in this photo? You should get this answer: 2023 BMW m340i sedan

Then ask it: What is the sticker price and color of the car in the photo? (It will get the sticker price right but get the name of the color wrong. The real color is Tanzanite blue)

Note: Gemini struggles with images that are a bit out of focus, so make sure you use clear images. Also: Name the image something like "dog" instead of the type of dog to challenge Gemini. Also remove any metadata (File info in Photoshop)

C. Fact-check: Upload a photo into Gemini and ask it to fact-check it and try to find its origin. I've had mixed results but it has fact-checked accurately (or cast doubt) over the authenticity of a fake or doctored image.

D. Create a website out of a cocktail napkin sketch (photo of it) Load the image from our practice folder slugged website test and use this prompt:

Write a brief HTML JS to turn this mockup into a colorful website

Use more prompts to make adjustments (text, color, etc.)

Copy the HTML/JS text and test it in this tool: W3Schools Tryit Editor

E. Write a product description for the photo slugged "toothbrush.jpeg" in the exercise folder. Load the image and use this prompt.

Can you generate a product description for this image, highlighting all of the key features?

Note: It should give you product info for this: Waterpik Complete Care 5.0 Water Flosser and Sonic Toothbrush

- E. Step-by-step on how to generate images in Gemini (source for exercise: Al Tools Report newsletter)
 - 1. Open it. Note's Gemini's image generation is accessible in most countries,

excluding the EU, and Canada.

Midjourney: Midjourney is one of the many image generators that have taken the art world by storm. In the free version, you use it by sending chat prompts to the Al in Discord, which is good and bad — you get to see everyone else's art, but they also get to see yours. If you use a paid version your prompts and images can be only seen by you.

DALL-E 2: Made by OpenAI, the same company that built ChatGPT, DALL-E 2 is also capable of stunning AI-generated images. It's particularly good at copying different art styles and can produce photorealistic images more successfully than other generators.

Stable Diffusion/Stability Al: Allows you to ask for a particular image with both a positive prompt and a negative prompt. You can also adjust a "guidance" slider that determines how closely the image generator sticks to your prompt.

Lexica: A search engine for every image ever made using Stable Diffusion, which can help you find/improve on prompts.

Stockimg.ai: This tool is designed for practical purposes like book covers, logos, posters, digital wallpaper, and the like.

Adobe Firefly: Adobe has partnered with Google to integrate Firefly into Google Gemini, the company's rival AI software to ChatGPT. Introduced at the Google I/O conference in May 2023, users can prompt an illustration in Gemini, which will then connect seamlessly to Firefly to create the image. Firefly has some cool features aimed at solving problems for creatives and visual journalists: AI video editing, 3D modeling, text-to-image, photo editing and more. Be careful with ethics when using this tool on news photographs.

Podcasting Tools

Descript: An Al-powered editor that automatically transcribes your audio and video recordings so that you can edit them just like text. It also uses Al to remove background

noise and improve recording quality with a click (via Studio Sound), detect filler words like "um" and "uh," and can insert Al voices — even correct misspoken words with a synthesized version of your own voice, if you want — via its Overdub feature.

Podcastle: A cloud recorder and Al-powered editor that lets you record a remote interview, edit, and mix all in one app. It also has transcription capabilities, an Al-powered sound quality tool called Magic Dust, and Al voices.

Resound: Resound is an Al-powered audio editor built to automatically detect filler words like "um" and "uh" and remove them from your recording.

Adobe Podcast: This is Adobe's answer to Descript — an Al-powered text-based audio editor that can automatically enhance speech. It also enables remote recording.

Auphonic: Upload your file, and Auphonic will automatically optimize your recording and polish up the quality of the audio. You can choose from a variety of audio algorithms, including a leveler, normalization, filtering, and noise reduction, and it can even stitch an intro and outro onto your episode if you want.

Cleanvoice.ai: Like Auphonic, Cleanvoice is a standalone Al audio tool that can remove unwanted sounds, but it focuses more on speech imperfections like filler words, stutters, and those spitty, clicky mouth sounds.

Listnr: If you want AI voices, Listnr's got them. Paste text into their text-to-speech converter, and the app will convert it into one of their 600 voices in seconds. At that point, it's ready to turn into a podcast, use as a video voiceover, star in a Home Alone contraption to scare away burglars, whatever you need it for.

Alitu: Alitu brands itself as an Al-powered one-stop shop for podcast production. You can record remotely with hosts or guests, polish up the audio, edit the content, generate transcripts, and publish all from a single platform.

Dubb: If you're more interested in the recording part of podcasting than the marketing part, Dubb is for you. It uses AI to generate not only transcripts, but episode titles, show notes, newsletter content, Twitter threads, even generative AI TikTok videos.

Runway: Half Al image generator, half Al-powered video editor, Runway can either create a video from scratch using only text or edit your video with futuristic tools like background or object removal, motion tracking, and automatic "beat" detection, along with staples like automatic noise removal and subtitles.

Aug X Labs: It's automatic B-roll powered by Al. Just upload an audio or video recording and Aug X Labs' prompt-to-video tool will add relevant images based on what's being said.

Pictory: Pictory is an Al-powered video generator and editor that can create videos from scripts and blog posts with Al text-to-speech voices and automatic B-roll footage. You can also use it to edit existing videos with a Descript-style text-based editor, and even create short snippets for social media with just a few clicks.

Synthesia: You've heard of text-to-speech, but what about text-to-virtual-avatar? With just plain text (in up to 65 languages), Synthesia generates a realistic looking virtual avatar to deliver your lines talking-head style. Instead of watching stock footage paired with an Al voice, you can watch a realistic "person" walk you through an instructional video or product demo, which, while definitely in uncanny valley territory, is a lot more engaging. (Descript uses Synthesia for internal presentations all the time, in fact.) Price: The personal plan is \$30 for 10 video credits/month. This tool is good for creating training videos.

D-ID: D-ID can generate talking humans, but it can *also* generate talking monsters. That's because it can combine facial images — either real ones or Al-generated ones — with audio or text to make them speak.

Elai: Elai mixes automatic video generation with Al avatars for a really easy way to make videos in minutes. You can generate footage from a blog post URL, product images and descriptions, or even a slide deck, then choose your human avatar and put the Al to work.

InVideo: InVideo lets you create entire videos in minutes from a script, article, or blog

post — or existing footage — with an eye-popping 6,000 templates organized by platform, industry, and content type. It can also remove backgrounds, add Al voiceovers, and automatically resize your video for any platform.

VEED: VEED is a web-based video editor that can do screen recording, automatic subtitles, Al voiceovers, and a bunch of other things to make your videos look polished and professional.

- The most important thing is to play with the stylize parameter.
- The default value is 100.
- Like v5, a lower stylize value makes your image cleaner and more minimalistic.

MidJourney also follows your instructions more. For example:

A higher stylize value makes your image more detailed and artistic. For example:

However, it also makes the images more messy, and MJ won't always listen to your instructions.

Now, what's the difference between Midjourney v5 and v6?

By default, v6 is much more detailed and artistic than v5.


It also struggles with minimalistic images.

If you want to fix this, you can:

- 1. Use a low stylize value between 0 and 100
- 2. Add "minimalistic" and "plain white background" to the prompt (very important)
- 3. Add "--style raw" at the end of your prompt
