- authority: The ability to exert control over a country. In the UK, Parliament has a high degree of authority over passing or repealing laws.
- austerity: Economic restructuring, usually cutting social programs or privatizing parastatals, in response to heavy debt or deficit burdens. Mexico had to implement austerity measures in the 80s and 90s due to a drop in oil prices and overspending due to ISI.
- 3. authoritarian rule: A non-democratic society where most positions with any significant influence are unelected (such as Iran and the supreme leader).
- 4. bonyads: A non-oil sector in the Iranian economy that distributes revenue to supporters of the Islamic regime.
- bureaucracy: A chain of command that performs some function in the government. In the UK, the bureaucracy assists in drafting and implementing legislation
- 6. camarilla: The series of patron-client networks in Mexico's government (usually loyalty in exchange for job security or promotions.)
- catch all party: A political party that accommodates the beliefs of a wide group of people such as the PRI in Mexico.
