COURSE FORMAT:

Lectures, discussion, essays, collaborative mixed-media projects, includes self, peer and instructor feedback.

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Criticism and analysis of function, role and responsibility of mass media in modern society from the consumer perspective. Includes the ethical problems and issues facing each media format, with the effect of political, economic, and cultural factors on the operation of the media. Explores media literacy as the ability to strategically access, analyze, evaluate and produce various forms of communicative media, and as a 21st century literacy skill fundamental to responsible participatory digital citizenship.

OBJECTIVES/LEARNING OUTCOMES:

- 1) Increase analytic literacy skills in deciphering mediated messaging and the cultural impact of media use, production, and distribution in society.
- 2) Develop awareness and articulate the role of media tools and texts in historical contexts, ranging from issues of access to social change, to include exploring potential implications for future generations.
- 3) Identify, use and apply key concepts, models and tools for media evaluation, analysis and production.

- 4) Specifically analyze and evaluate the ways form, content and context work together to create meaning in a wide range of genres including commercial, independent and experimental media, including critical examination of controversial current events topics across forms and distribution channels.
- 5) Develop and apply production-oriented learned media literacy skills in creating mixed-media projects, to include connected learning, constructing one's own meaning and positions, and civically engaging as global digital citizens.

Attendance/Class Participation
