1. Students will *define* what home means to them by *creating* a mind map to help them *associate* words with 'home', looking at contemporary artworks that portray home to help inspire them.
2. Students will *explore* an artistic medium of their choice to *use* in their final project.
3. Students will *reflect* on their product and artistic process by answering reflection questions and filling out a rubric.

Visual: Students will interpret works of art that have to do with the idea of home or portray the feeling of home to learn more about the artist and how they might feel about their home based on their works.

Oral: Students will shout out things that remind them of home or word associations to create a class mind map about home.

Written: Students will write their own mind map full of words and feelings unique to them about home.

**What do my students already know/don't know?**

Encourages and provides opportunities for students to make connections to prior learning (TCQS 1c)

Anticipates student misconceptions related to learning and addresses those misconceptions during instruction (TCQS 1c)

My students may or may not have created a mind map before. To prevent misconceptions about what a mind map might be or look like, I will create one on the board for them to see exactly what it should look like and how I create it. I think students may interpret the prompt very literally and draw their physical home dwelling, so I will prevent this misconception by encouraging them to portray the feeling or what else reminds them of home using that mind map and artist examples that are more than just a house.

They will have a few SHoM check-ins for progress, and then a final self-assessment rubric based on the SHoM and a series of questions (in the slide) asking them about their strengths, areas to improve, and what they learned.

There will be three reflective questions on google classroom for students to answer. What was successful about your artwork? What could be improved? What did you learn during this project?

Examples of artists from diverse backgrounds and cultures with diverse thoughts and ideas will encourage students to think creatively. They will also tell students that home looks different for everyone - it might not always be positive, it could elicit some heavy or negative feelings too, and that's okay. Students might have very different home lives, some of them might have multiple homes they move between, homes in different countries and different citizenships, they might move around a lot, they might have never moved once. I will lead a discussion about all of these different types of homes and how each is equally valid and acceptable, and the most important part is portraying what it means to them.
