





Dear Pro Tem McGuire, Speaker Rivas, Chair Wiener, Chair Gabriel, Chair Richardson, and Chair Ramos:

We, the 259 undersigned organizations, representing every county in California, ranging from sexual and domestic violence agencies, to district attorneys, to children's advocacy centers, write requesting **\$260 million in one-time funding** to address continuous cuts to the federal Victims of Crime Act Fund (VOCA) and prevent the potentially catastrophic impact these cuts will have on survivors of crime.

VOCA is at the center of California's response to supporting victims of crime and is relied on by local governments, law enforcement, and service providers to fund resources that provide critical care to those facing the traumatic impacts of being a survivor of crime. These programs include counseling, rapid rehousing, legal services, crisis response, and other essential resources

that support vulnerable individuals over both the short and long term. Entities facilitating these programs, which will already need to lay off staff, scale back services, and increase wait times to connect with victims, will now, in some cases, be forced to shut down completely if this minimum amount of funding is not provided. The impacts of these cuts will fall hardest on smaller programs, communities that have been historically underserved, and rural programs. These programs in 2022 alone assisted over 816,000 survivors across the state.

"I am a survivor of sexual and domestic violence. I was held hostage, beaten, raped, tortured, and shot. If rape crisis centers didn't exist, I would have never been able to tell my story. The staff at the rape crisis center lifted me from the ground where I was left to die." - Elvira Herrera

In 2024, California made the choice to assist these survivors by allocating \$103 million in one-time funding and passing AB 2432 (Gabriel) to address short-term and long-term solutions.

AB 2432 represents a critical advancement in ensuring sustainable funding for crime victim services in California by establishing a new revenue source through accountability measures for corporate misconduct. By holding corporations who harm the public accountable for financial and legal wrongdoing, the bill promises to generate significant resources in the years ahead to support survivors and the services they rely on. While AB 2432 is a vital step toward insulating California's crime victim services from the volatility of federal funding, its revenue will depend on the successful prosecution of future corporate cases, which will take time to yield results. Immediate and direct financial support remains essential to prevent a disruption in services that form the backbone of California's response to crime victims.

The \$103 million provided in the June final budget was the amount requested by the California Governor's Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES) to maintain current funding levels for FY24-25. Cal OES <u>shared publicly</u> that this was the bare minimum needed to support the nearly 400 programs experiencing a 44.7% cut in federal funding, with no additional funding to carry over to FY25-26. With the combination of these efforts, our state agreed to supporting survivors for the foreseeable future.

"This funding was vital for our children's advocacy center to continue delivering services to our entire county. It allows us to continue providing child victims of abuse with forensic interviews and mental health services. Losing these funds would have cut out our therapy department completely and would have forced law enforcement to decide which cases of child abuse were most 'important', leading to fewer hurt children getting services. We want to say, 'Thank you for allowing us to continue being the crucial service provider in our county for kids of all types of abuse." says Denise Wyatt, Executive Director of Family Healing Center in Fresno, California.

While we wait for AB 2432 to take effect, survivors still find themselves in a precarious situation. With ongoing instability in federal funding and a new Congress and administration, the future of VOCA remains uncertain.

Programs and the crime survivors they serve will be deeply impacted by these cuts. As a result of this reduced funding, organizations may need to lay off staff, scale back on services specific to

historically marginalized and underserved communities, increase wait time to connect victims of crime to valuable services, and more. For survivors, this will reduce their ability to access the support and healing they need and deserve. The impacts of these cuts will fall hardest on smaller programs, rural programs, and communities that have been historically underserved including LGBTQ+ people and people of color. Data has consistently shown that LGBTQ+ people experience hate violence, domestic violence, and sexual assault at higher rates than non-LGBTQ people, with trans folks, bisexual women, and BIPOC LGBTQ+ folks at particularly high risk. We cannot afford to place more restrictions and barriers on LGBTQ+ people's ability to access support, safety, housing security, and legal protections.

To be clear, a choice to not fund these services is a choice to stand by as programs serving 816,000 survivors are cut dramatically. Not providing this minimal investment also has the potential to exacerbate our homelessness crisis, silence immigrant and undocumented communities, and leave survivors at risk of being victimized yet again. We understand that you as state leaders are continuing to navigate through a challenging budget cycle. However, we believe amongst California's top priorities should be ensuring that crime victims are not further victimized because of a lack of resources to support their recovery.

Supporting survivors of crime is one of the most impactful public safety investments that California can make and we strongly urge you to prioritize this funding request.
