

CPL Henry “Joseph” Pfeil

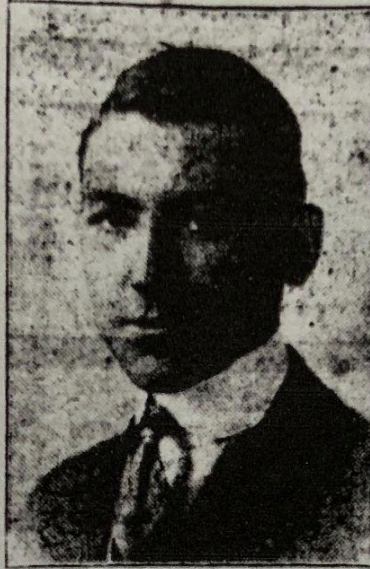
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WILL BURY SOLDIER

Remains of War Hero Will be Here Tomorrow and Funeral Will be on Monday.

The remains of Henry Joseph Pfeil, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph H. Pfeil, 29 Madison street, one of the Oshkosh war heroes will be buried at Oshkosh. He made the supreme sacrifice on Oct. 11, 1918, in the Meuse-Argonne offensive, when he was killed in action. The body arrived at Hoboken and is expected here tomorrow. Corporal

Pfeil was a runner attached to Company B, 127th Infantry, Thirty-second division. He distinguished himself for bravery and was promoted from private to corporal. The day following his promotion he was killed in action.

He was born Dec. 5, 1898, and was 19 years of age. He was graduated from the Oshkosh High school with the June class of 1916. While a student, he took an active part in athletics. When the first call for volunteers was sounded, he responded and the next March found him in France. His unit saw active service in Alsace-Lorraine, at Chateau-Thierry and was in the Meuse-Argonne offensive when he lost his life.

The funeral will be held Monday morning at 9 o'clock from St. Mary's church and will be of a formal military nature. Besides his parents, Corporal Pfeil is survived by two sisters and one brother, Mrs. George Stein, Miss Ruth Frances Pfeil and Roman V. Pfeil. Friends are requested to omit flowers.
