Jan was such an incredible force for good in the geosciences community, and a major reason why Brown undergrads are highly sought after in top-tier graduate schools. My heart is heavy for Terry and her family, for fellow alumni for which Jan *was* family, and also for the upcoming generations of DEEPS undergraduates who won't get to benefit from Jan's unrivaled compassion and dedication to student success and well being. It says everything about Jan that her passing leads one to think of the loss for people she had never met.

I spent the last few days trying to formulate a note to share with Jan, hoping that she was hospitalized over something minor, which would give me more time to try and (succinctly) describe her impact. The words didn't fail me, but the succinctness did. So, here's a tribute to Jan in longer form.

I've been incredibly lucky to have stayed in touch with Jan after graduating and as I somehow ended up in academia (to my surprise, but never to Jan, who had a preternatural ability to see the future). Looking back over my emails with Jan tells the story of our relationship, one she shared with so many students over the years:

• Twenty-five email chains in the last two weeks of senior year spring semester, covering everything from printing geologic cross sections, a Geo ping pong tournament, to an ice cream-enabled Sunday discussion of senior research projects;

- A one year gap, followed by much needed critical feedback on PhD applications, provided on tight timelines (her record response was 42 minutes after my initial email, during the semester no less!);
- A smattering of "great to see you!" emails, all started by Jan, all arising from her legendary reunion Saturday office hours. Knocking on her ground floor window to be let in the GeoChem door will be an indelible memory for many Geo grads;
- The wonderful celebration of Jan's career in May, 2013 ("don't call it a retirement, partner!");
- A series of exchanges from my various .edu email addresses, seeking increasingly complex advice on postdoctoral research, faculty positions, and building lab groups.

My last interaction with Jan was facilitated by her, of course: On the second day of my assistant professorship, an email subject line "Hello neighbor!:)" arrived in my new inbox from none other. It was a wonderfully touching action from her, with the usual sense of magic behind it (how did she know the start date??). The email chain led to a visit to Brown later that year. Jan's office had moved, and she no longer had the window to knock on, but the setup was the same - even down to the chair, right next to the door, where I had first sat half a lifetime ago as an unsure GEO22 student. For the next hour, we talked about how to center undergraduates in the research process. Jan had the same fire as always; she took my half-baked plans for undergraduate interns into a full-fledged summer internship program. In that hour, she created a playbook I use to this day, and will continue to use for years to come.

I think we all know that there's no replacing Jan. It's impossible. People with that depth of scientific and emotional intelligence come around maybe once a generation, likely less. But Jan was a top-flight educator, and has been training us all for years in the art and science of inspiring students in the Earth Sciences. Everyone is partner, our doors are always open, and our time for students is never limited to regular business hours. Her approaches to teaching, relating, and knowing are now divided up and put into practice by the hundreds of alumni who were so fortunate to call Jan their professor, and their friend.

I just wish I could have had one more chance to sit in her office chair.
