

If I Ran the Circus

As You Read the Book:

Prepare a list of sight words from the book, and as you read the book, they can discover those words. For younger kids, maybe you can let them lasso the word - well, land the lasso on the word as they see it. You can make a lasso with yarn or maybe use one of those tiny bubble blowers that come with the party favor bubble bottles:)

Discuss rhyme and reason! :) What words were newly made-up to help with rhyming? And what common words were just changed a bit to help with the rhyming? For example: myself changed to *mysolf* to rhyme with Rolf/golf.

Take turns reading it out aloud - tongue twisters make it a total riot.

After You Read the Book:

Discussion Questions:

Have you seen any place where you might find strange things like described in the book? What was the place and what did you see there?

Have you been to a circus? What was the most interesting act you saw there?

If you ran the circus, what would it be like? What would you do? (Or it could also be a choice of place - like the zoo, the library, the school, or even the nation)

Points to Ponder: Can any creature have teeth weighing 60 pounds each? What creature do you think has the heaviest teeth? Or some other point to ponder from the book!

Rhyming games:

Pick a word or two from the book, and come up with rhyming words for it. Make it a team competition event maybe!

Make up your own creatures and write a short rhyme using that made-up creature name. If you love elephants and a platypus, then the creature could be a elephantapus who drives the school bus, and his best friend is a dogapotamus.

Or maybe it is a purple cat-like creature called a purplitty who dances to a ditty, and always says something witty, this purplitty that is plenty pretty.
