
The Title of the Paper Should Consist of Only a Few Words That Accurately Describe the Content of The Paper. (Center, Bold, 16pt, Capitalize Each Word Except for Prepositions)

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Abstract (10 PT)

An abstract is often presented separate from the article, so it must be able to stand alone. A well-prepared abstract enables the reader to identify the basic content of a document quickly and accurately, to determine its relevance to their interests, and thus to decide whether to read the document in its entirety. The abstract should be informative and completely self-explanatory, provide a clear statement of the problem, the proposed approach or solution, and point out major findings and conclusions. **The Abstract should be 150 to 250 words in length.** References should be avoided, but if essential, then cite the author(s) and year(s). Standard nomenclature should be used, and non-standard or uncommon abbreviations should be avoided, but if essential they must be defined at their first mention in the abstract itself. No literature should be cited. The keyword list provides the opportunity to add 5 to 7 keywords, used by the indexing and abstracting services, in addition to those already present in the title (9 pt).

Introduction (Time New Roman, Bold, 12 pt.)

The main text format consists of flat left-right columns on A4 paper (quarto). The margin text from the left and top is 2.5 cm, and from the right and bottom is 2 cm. The manuscript is written in Microsoft Word, single-spaced, with **Time New Roman 12 pt for English articles, or a maximum of 15 pages.**

The title of an article should consist of the fewest possible words that accurately describe the content of the paper. The title should be succinct and informative. Do not use acronyms or abbreviations in your title and do not mention the method you used, unless your paper reports on the development of a new method. Titles are often used in information-retrieval systems. Avoid writing long formulas with subscripts in the title. Omit all waste words such as "A study of...", "Investigations of...", "Implementation of...", "Observations on...", "Effect of....", "Analysis of..." , "Design of..." , etc.

A concise and factual abstract is required. The abstract should briefly state the purpose of the research, the principal results, and major conclusions. An abstract is often presented separately from the article, so it must be able to stand alone. For this reason, references should be avoided, but if essential, cite the author(s) and year(s). Also, non-standard or uncommon abbreviations should be avoided; however, if they are essential, they must be defined at their first mention in the abstract itself. Immediately after the abstract, provide a maximum of 5 keywords, using American spelling and avoiding general and plural terms and multiple concepts (for example, avoid 'and', 'of'). Be sparing with abbreviations: only abbreviations firmly

established in the field may be eligible. These keywords will be used for indexing purposes. For Thai articles, a Thai abstract is also required

The Introduction section should provide: i) a clear background, ii) a clear statement of the problem, iii) the relevant literature on the subject, iv) the proposed approach or solution, and v) the new value of research, which is innovation (within 3-6 paragraphs). It should be understandable to colleagues from a broad range of humanities and social sciences. Organization and citation of the bibliography should follow the Institute of APA7 (7th edition of the American Psychological Association's Publication Manual). Terms in foreign languages are written in italics. The text should be divided into sections, each with a separate heading and numbered consecutively [3]. The section or subsection headings should be typed on a separate line, e.g., 1. INTRODUCTION. A full article usually follows a standard structure: Introduction, Research Objective, Hypothesis (if applicable), Literature Review, Research Framework (if applicable), Research Methodology, Findings/Results, Discussion, Conclusion and Implications, Acknowledgment, Ethical Approval, and References.
