Course Requirements:

Your grade for this class will be computed by total number of points accumulated in the following categories:

1. <u>Homework/Participation (25% of Final Grade)</u> – Gives students the opportunity to practice the language and allows them to demonstrate their understanding of the topic being discussed.

- This grade will be based upon contribution to group activities, completion of warm-up activities, thoughtful participation in discussion, and at times preparing work for class so that you can actively participate (workbook hw, reviewing, bringing all necessary materials both in person and online).
- > Speaking and participating in class are **integral** parts of learning a new language, therefore I expect students to speak in class when asked.
- > Please also remember: if you are absent from class it is **impossible** to participate!
- The homework will be posted every day on the board, in Google classroom, and posted in the Google Classroom calendar. Homework will be checked every day at the beginning of class. You will need to have a different colored pen when reviewing HW to make corrections. Work will not be accepted late. Please note that if a student comes to class without the prepared homework, a grade of 0 will be given and it will be marked as Missing. This is to ensure that parents have access and knowledge of assignments in the parent portal that their students are not completing work on time. I do not give partial credit on homework assignments. You are expected to try to do all of the homework to the best of your ability. If you do not understand something you are expected to talk to me before it's due (send an email, send a Remind message, come to 7th hour).
- You will receive two "Homework Passes" per semester. This allows the assignment to be turned in within one week of the original due date with no late penalty. You must fill out the pass with the assignment info and turn it in with your completed HW. The purpose of the "Homework Pass" is for life's emergencies that make it impossible to complete your homework. They are not transferable to other students and they only apply to daily homework assignments (not projects).
- ➤ You have 2 school days to complete homework assignments when you have an excused absence the day the assignment is given. You must turn in homework assignments given prior to an absence the next day you return from an excused absence.

2. <u>Graded Work (15% of Final Grade)</u> – Any classwork/homework assignment that is used to demonstrate progress in the language. These are assignments generally graded for accuracy and that receive feedback from the teacher.

- Most of the time we go over the previous evening's homework in class to clarify and answer questions. Intermittently, I collect homework for correctness and it will then count as "graded work," so trying your best and coming to me for help are paramount to your success in this class.
- ➤ Graded work might also include activities such as pop quizzes, FlipGrids for speaking practice, rewriting compostions, or classwork that is collected in class or due in a following class in which you receive my feedback.
- Think of graded work not as tests/quizzes, but any work in which you are being graded for accuracy, given feedback on, and will sometimes have opportunities to demonstrate improvement.
- ➤ It is the responsibility of the student to obtain assignments when absent. When students are absent, they are expected to <u>check Google Classroom and come to 7th hour</u> for assignments and other content missed during their absence.

3. <u>Assessments (60% of Final Grade)</u> – Written tests, quizzes, speaking assessments and projects that demonstrate accuracy and mastery of essential learnings. This will include a semester final exam.

- ➤ Vocabulary and grammar quizzes will be given on a regular basis. Quizzes will be shorter but consistent to assess continuous learning throughout the semester.
- A summative test will be completed at the end of every chapter. I will announce in advance when to expect tests/projects so that you can plan accordingly, usually with more than a week's notice.
- ➤ If a student has an excused absence the day of a quiz or test, it is **the responsibility of the student** to make up the quiz or test within a week. If the student does not make up the test/communicate with me, the test/quiz will be given a zero.

Grading Scale

Grades are earned, not given. Points are earned as outlined above. I do not grade on a curve, nor do I provide extra credit for individuals – extra credit opportunities will be available to the entire class. Grades are cumulative on a semester basis. Letter grades follow the D'Evelyn grading scale: A=90-100%, B=80-89%, C=70-79%, D=60-69%, F=below 60%. Grades can be viewed at any time via the Infinite Campus Portal. *Multipliers will be applied to assignments throughout each semester to reflect the cumulative nature of the course.

Make-up Work for Absences (per D'Evelyn Policies)

Please check my website regularly to see what you have/will miss due to absence(s.) You are responsible for your missed work.

- Excused Absences Students with excused absences must be afforded 2 school days per day absent to complete make-up work. If you know that you are going to be absent, make arrangements IN ADVANCE!
- Unexcused Absences Unexcused absences are defined as absences not covered by the grounds for
 excused absences. Unexcused absences result in school-issued disciplinary consequences. Any absence
 resulting from a suspension is considered an unexcused absence. Students with unexcused absences
 must be given two days per day absent. In accordance with the district unexcused absence make-up
 policy.

Cheating and Plagiarism

Cheating and plagiarism are very serious violations of the academic program at D'Evelyn Jr./Sr. High School. D'Evelyn holds high academic expectations for all students and academic integrity is an extremely important aspect of those expectations. Any student caught cheating on a quiz, test, homework, or any classroom assignment; or found guilty of plagiarism (to pass off the ideas or works of another as one's own without crediting the source); or caught giving work to others will receive a grade of "zero" on that assignment or paper. Consequences for cheating/plagiarism will range from a detention to suspension in addition to a zero on the assignment.

- FYI using computer translation websites and apps (GOOGLE TRANSLATE) and artificial intelligence websites IS CONSIDERED PLAGIARISM. Looking up one word is different from entire sentences/phrases. It is easy to tell when a student has used one of these websites 1. It uses grammar and vocabulary that you do not yet know, 2. It makes errors, IT IS NOT ALWAYS CORRECT!

 BOTTOM LINE I want to see YOUR WORK, what comes out of YOUR HEAD, not something you copied from a computer screen. Getting translations from native speakers is also a form of plagiarism.
- I fully support student collaboration: students working together to help each other on homework assignments. There is a difference between collaboration and cheating (i.e. copying another student's answers into your own workbook/packets before school or at lunch). Be honest with yourself and show integrity and don't waste your or my time. YOU KNOW THE DIFFERENCE, do the work yourself.
