Step 1: Research

1. Using the links provided on Mr. Bradford's webpage as a starting point, use online resources to research your assigned World War I weapon – Make sure your sources are reliable (NO WIKIPEDIA!)
2. You must compile information from at least three different sources to complete your research packet
3. Properly cite your sources on the last page of this packet.

Step 2: Presentation

1. You will use the information you gathered to create a digital presentation for your WWI weapon (Google Slides, Google Draw, etc.)
2. Your presentation must include information from each section of the research packet & visual aides to support the information
 - a. This is a digital presentation, so take advantage of what is out there to create a very engaging/informative presentation
3. You will then present your project to the rest of the class (2-3 minutes) who will be taking notes on your presentation.

Research Packet

What did your weapon do?

- Describe your weapon (How did it work? What was its purpose?)
- Was it a new weapon or an improvement on an old weapon?

How did your weapon impact the war?

- What country(s) utilized this weapon and how was it part of their WWI strategy?
- Explain your weapons effectiveness on the battle field

Pros and Cons?

- What were the advantages for an army using your weapon? How could it help their war effort?
- Were there any potential problems with your weapon? Were there any scenarios where it would not have worked or been less effective?

- What role did the Industrial Revolution play in the development of your weapon or any improvements made to it.
- How did your weapon contribute to WWI being the first major “Industrial War”?
