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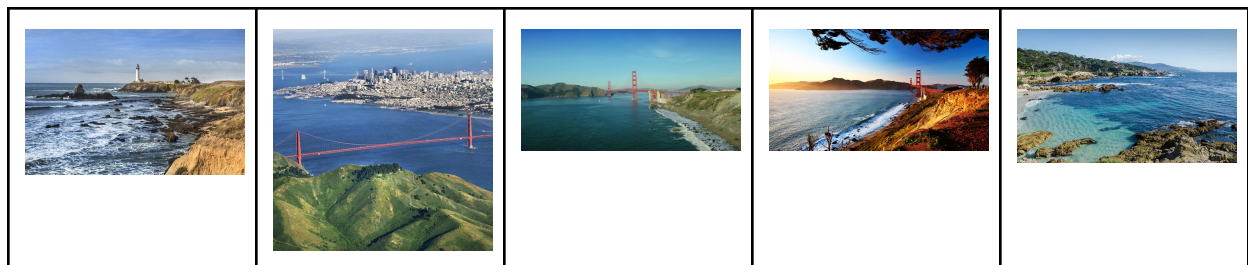
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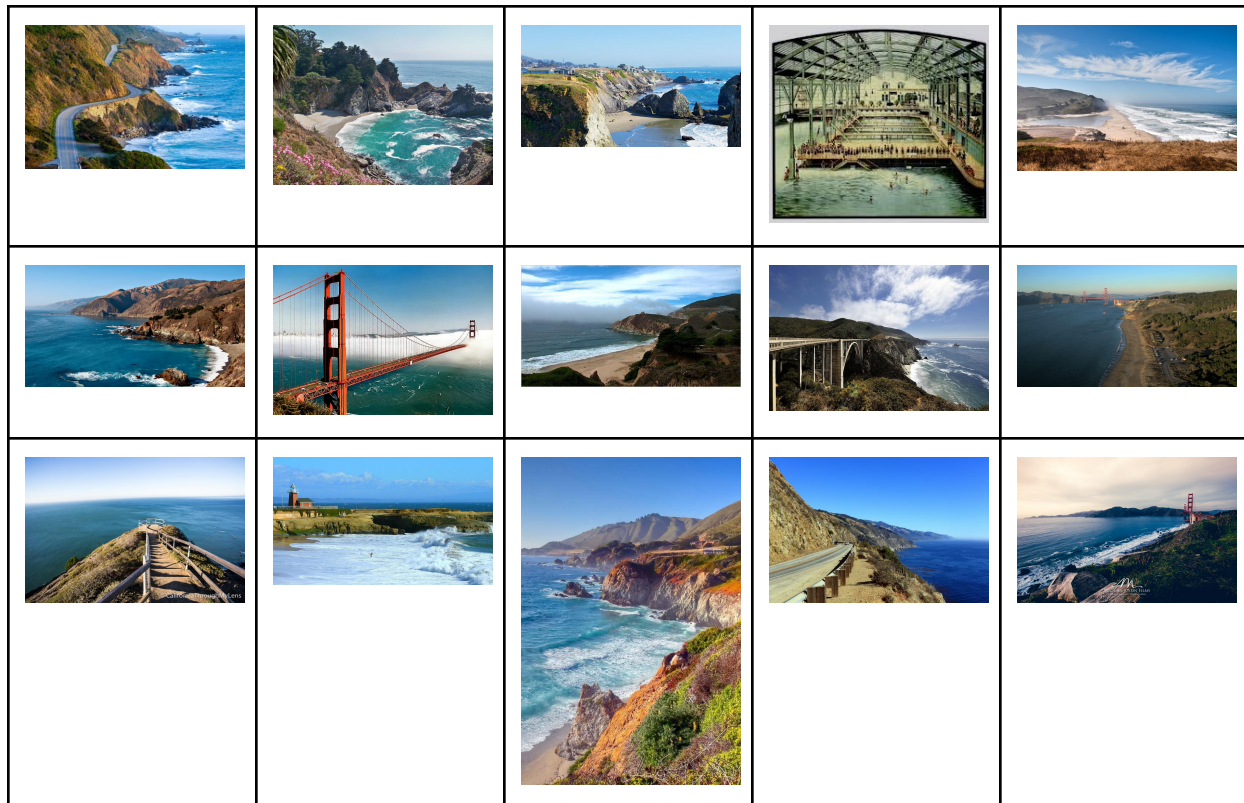
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Simple facts:

1. Sutro Baths were made in 1894 By Adolph Sutro, but was destroyed by the 1993 fire.
2. Big sur has one of the tallest single span concrete bridges in the world.
3. In 1863, developers constructed the first Cliff House as a destination restaurant where visitors could enjoy the dramatic ocean views first hand.
4. During the late 19th century, Adolph Sutro developed this undeveloped land into an expansive public area. Overtime, he established the Sutro Heights gardens, the Sutro Baths and rebuilt the second Cliff House.
5. Fort Point was built between 1853-1861 by the U.S. Army engineers as part of a defense center.
6. The Palais de la Légion d'Honneur was first called The Hôtel de Salm and it was designed by Pierre Rousseau in 1782 for the Prince of Salm-Kyrburg.
7. Fort Funston was named in honor of Frederick N. Funston (1865–1917), a Major General in the United States Army with strong connections to San Francisco.
8. Fort Point has been called "the pride of the Pacific," "the Gibraltar of the West Coast," and "one of the most perfect models of masonry in America."
9. In 1896 the new Cliff House opens for business. The Sutro Pleasure Grounds, an amusement park, is opened at the same time. Neither of them do well financially.
10. Charles Butler constructed Cliff House in 1863.

Discussion Facts:

1. The earliest name for Lands End is 'Penwith Steort' recorded in 997; Penwith in Cornish means 'extreme end' and Steort is Old English for 'tail' or 'end.'
2. Fort Point has been called "the pride of the Pacific," "the Gibraltar of the West Coast," and "one of the most perfect models of masonry in America."
3. Alma Spreckels persuaded her husband, sugar magnate Adolph B. Spreckels, to recapture the beauty of the Legion of Honor as a new art museum for San Francisco. Legion of Honor

In 1915 Alma Spreckels fell in love with the French Building at San Francisco's Panama Pacific International Exposition. The pavilion was a replica of the Palais de la Légion d'Honneur in Paris, one of the distinguished 18th-century landmarks on the left bank of the Seine. At the close of the 1915 exposition, the French government granted them permission to construct a permanent replica, but World War I delayed the groundbreaking for this ambitious project until 1921 and was completed in 1924.



Cliff House

The Cliff House is a restaurant on Point Lobos Avenue perched on the headland above the cliffs just north of Ocean Beach, in the Outer Richmond neighborhood of San Francisco, California. It has had five major incarnations since its beginnings in 1858. It now overlooks the site of the former Sutro Baths and is part of the Golden Gate National Recreation Area, operated by the National Park Service.



Sutro Baths

The Sutro Baths was a large, privately owned public saltwater swimming pool complex in the Lands End area of the Outer Richmond District in western San Francisco, California. Built in 1896, it is located near the Cliff House, Seal Rocks, and Sutro Heights Park. The facility burned down in June 1966 and is now in ruins. The site is within the Golden Gate National Recreation Area and the Sutro Historic District.

**Lands End**

Lands End is a park in San Francisco within the Golden Gate National Recreation Area. It is a rocky and windswept shoreline at the mouth of the Golden Gate, situated between the Sutro District and Lincoln Park and abutting Fort Miley Military Reservation. A memorial to the USS San Francisco stands in the park. Numerous hiking trails follow the former rail beds of the Ferries and Cliff House Railway along the cliffs and also down to the shore. There is also a fort situated in Lands End called Fort Miley.

**Military Forts****Fort Point**

Fort Point stood guard over the narrow of golden gate bridge for over 150 years.

It was built between 1853-1861 by the U.S. Army engineers as part of a defense center. Designed at the height of the Gold Rush, the Fort and its companion fortifications would protect the Bay's important commercial and military installations against foreign attack.

Fort Funston

Fort Funston is a former harbor defense installation located in the southwestern corner of San Francisco. It used to be known as the Lake Merced Military Reservation but the fort is now a protected area within the Golden Gate National Recreation Area (GGNRA).

Fort Funston was named in honor of Frederick N. Funston (1865–1917), a Major General in the United States Army with strong connections to San Francisco.

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Lands End

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- Fort Funston used to be known as the Lake Merced Military Reservation but the fort is now a protected area within the Golden Gate National Recreation Area (GGNRA)
- Fort Funston was named in honor of Frederick N. Funston (1865–1917), a Major General in the United States Army with strong connections to San Francisco.
- Fort Funston included several artillery batteries.
- The fort is located on Skyline Boulevard at John Muir Drive, west of Lake Merced.

Legion of Honor

- In 1915 Alma Spreckels fell in love with the French Building at San Francisco's Panama Pacific International Exposition.
- The pavilion was a replica of the Palais de la Légion d'Honneur in Paris, one of the distinguished 18th-century landmarks on the left bank of the Seine.
- It was first called The Hôtel de Salm and it was designed by Pierre Rousseau in 1782 for the Prince of Salm-Kyrburg.
- It was completed in 1788
- it was not destined to serve long as a royal residence; the German prince, whose fortunes fell with the French Revolution, lived there for only one year.

- Madame de Staël owned it briefly before Napoleon took it over in 1804 as the home of his newly established Légion d'Honneur, the order he created as a reward for civil and military merit.
- Alma Spreckels persuaded her husband, sugar magnate Adolph B. Spreckels, to recapture the beauty of the Legion of Honor as a new art museum for San Francisco. At the close of the 1915 exposition, the French government granted them permission to construct a permanent replica, but World War I delayed the groundbreaking for this ambitious project until 1921 and was completed in 1924.
- On Armistice of the year the doors open to the public. In keeping wishes to the donors, to "honor the dead while serving the living".

Sutro Baths

- Made by Adolph Sutro, a selfmade millionaire, in 1894
 - It held swimming areas, concerts, talent shows, and restaurants
 - Adolph Sutro died in 1898 and the baths just slowly became less popular
- When Adolph Sutro died in 1898 and the Sutro Baths slowly became less popular
- In 1964, there were plans to make the baths into apartments
 - In 1966, the leftovers of the baths got burned down in a fire
 - In 1993, the remains of the Sutro Baths was made part of the Golden Gate National Recreation Area
