**Brief Description of Bill:**

Requires the Department of Revenue to estimate the difference in surplus revenue calculations using prescribed methodologies, and transfer an amount equal to the difference for use for various purposes:

- (a) Reduction of the unfunded actuarial liability of the Public Employees Retirement System.
- (b) The costs of capital projects for which the state would otherwise have to issue revenue bonds.
- (c) Payment of debt service.
- (d) Expenses related to emergencies.
