## **Compare and Contrast Own Opinions**

One of the most important skills that students need to improve their reading comprehension is the *ability to distinguish between facts and opinions*, a higher order thinking skill. This skill is particularly important because of the widespread and increasing number of altered truths circulating the Internet through emails and social networking site propaganda. Too many people treat and share these questionable articles and posts as facts when they are merely opinion.

Students must learn to distinguish facts from opinions. They need to learn to question what they read, research it and determine the truth. The skill of identifying fact from opinion is a necessary skill for higher order comprehension and is also important for increasing assessment scores. Learning to discern what is true from what is false so that the decisions our students make are based on correct information is a critical life skill.

A *fact* is a statement that can be proven true or false. For example: "Birds have wings" is a fact.

If we look at its meaning in a dictionary, we can prove that birds are defined, in part, by their wings. Meanwhile, an *opinion* is a statement that cannot be proven true or false. It's based on the speaker's beliefs.

"Cats make better pets than dogs" is an opinion. You can't prove that cats make better pets than dogs. Some people might really prefer dogs. They'd say that cats make boring pets, while dogs are exciting. Neither opinion is right, since opinions are based on things like feelings and judgments. Well sometimes, opinions can be backed-up by facts.

If I were arguing for cats, I could point out that they clean themselves and don't eat as much as dogs. Plus, they don't need to be led outside for walks or require much care and attention because most of their lives are spent sleeping. These are all facts. They can be proven true with a little research.

With that said, "cats make better pets than dogs" is still an opinion, but an informed one.

Still confused in distinguishing between the two? Here are more things to consider about facts and opinions that may help you:

**Facts** are made up of *objective realities stated with unbiased words* while **Opinions** are always *subjective statements expressed with biased words*. To put it simply: facts are universal and does not differ from person to person. To every person, "birds have wings". If a statement isn't true for every person, then it's an opinion.

### **Compare or Contrast**

To **compare** means to look for things that are the **same**. To **contrast** means to look for things that are **different**. Writers use transition words to make writing easier to follow, and one kind of transition indicates that the writer is comparing or contrasting things. This organizational pattern emphasizes the similarities or differences between two or more items. The focus can be on just similarities, just differences, or both.


There were many trees where Sang Kancil lived so he never had trouble finding food. There were always lots of leaves. He spent his time running and jumping and looking into the river.




