5.d Resolution accepting assessment report for ILO 1, Critical Thinking and Information Competency, and recommendation for its use

Whereas Institutional Learning Outcomes (ILOs), rooted in the Mission of the College, define and identify the knowledge, behaviors, and skills the College would like students to acquire and develop throughout their CCSF educational experiences;

Whereas the Institutional Assessment Plan specifies that Institutional Learning Outcomes (ILOs) shall be assessed on a regular basis through a process with broad faculty participation coordinated by the Student Learning Outcome (SLO) Coordinators and the Academic Senate's Student Learning Outcome Committee (SLOC);

Whereas a thorough assessment of ILO 1, Critical Thinking and Information Competency, was conducted in 2025-2026 using both quantitative and qualitative data about the ILO, including quantitative analysis of assessments of SLOs mapped up from courses through programs to ILOs; dialogue with five departments especially connected to this ILO; and in-depth discussion at the SLO Committee meetings on several occasions;

Be it resolved that the Executive Council of the Academic Senate receives and accepts the Spring 2026 ILO 1 Assessment Report; and be it further

Resolved that the CCSF Academic Senate Executive Council recommend that this report be used, when relevant, during planning and improvement processes.

New Business

6.a On Shared Governance and Planning Processes Regarding the Future of the Downtown Campus

Whereas, decisions involving the reduction, consolidation, or closure of College instructional sites and campuses (aka centers) and such as Alemany Campus at 750 Eddy Street, Civic Center Campus on Market St, Fort Mason, the SF LGBT Community Center, 450 Church, Airport Campus and 33 Gough

St., have raised significant concerns regarding transparency, participatory governance, and the consistent application of established planning processes; and

Whereas, the Academic Senate has purview under Title 5 §53200 (“10+1”) over matters including educational program development, standards and policies regarding student preparation and success, and institutional planning and budget development processes, all of which are implicated when instructional sites and programs are substantially reduced or eliminated; and

Whereas, the Roles, Responsibilities and Processes (RRP) Handbook establishes processes intended to ensure broad consultation, shared governance participation, data-informed analysis, and meaningful engagement with affected constituencies when considering major institutional changes; and

Whereas, students, faculty, classified professionals, and community members have expressed substantial concern regarding the future of the Downtown (DTN) Campus (aka Center), including the potential impact on educational access, equity, and availability of ESL and credit and noncredit programming for historically underserved communities therefore be it

Resolved, that the Academic Senate recommends the College administration and Board of Trustees fully engage the participatory governance and planning processes outlined in the Roles, Responsibilities and Processes (RRP) Handbook regarding any reduction, consolidation, or closure of the Downtown (DTN) Center and its academic programming, including appropriate consultation with the Academic Senate under Title 5 §53200 (“10+1”); and

Resolved that this process should include broad engagement with affected constituencies, transparent review of relevant data and fiscal information, and consideration of the educational, equity, and community impacts of any proposed action, including the possible establishment of a representative task force or working group as provided for through shared governance processes.
