Crucially, the Literature Review must also establish and articulate the theoretical framework of the study. This framework is derived from the literature reviewed and serves as the cornerstone for the research methodology and analysis. It involves identifying, discussing, and integrating relevant theories, concepts, and models that align with the research question. The theoretical framework essentially offers a structured perspective for investigating the research problem and underpins the analytical approach of the study.

By effectively synthesizing the existing literature and clearly defining the theoretical framework, this section not only situates the research within the broader academic field but also demonstrates a scholarly understanding of the subject area. It sets the foundation for the research by linking it to the existing body of knowledge and outlining the theoretical approach that guides the study.

Materials and Methods

The Materials and Methods should be described with sufficient details to allow others to replicate and build on the published results. Please note that the publication of your manuscript implies that you must make all materials, data, computer code, and protocols associated with the publication available to readers. 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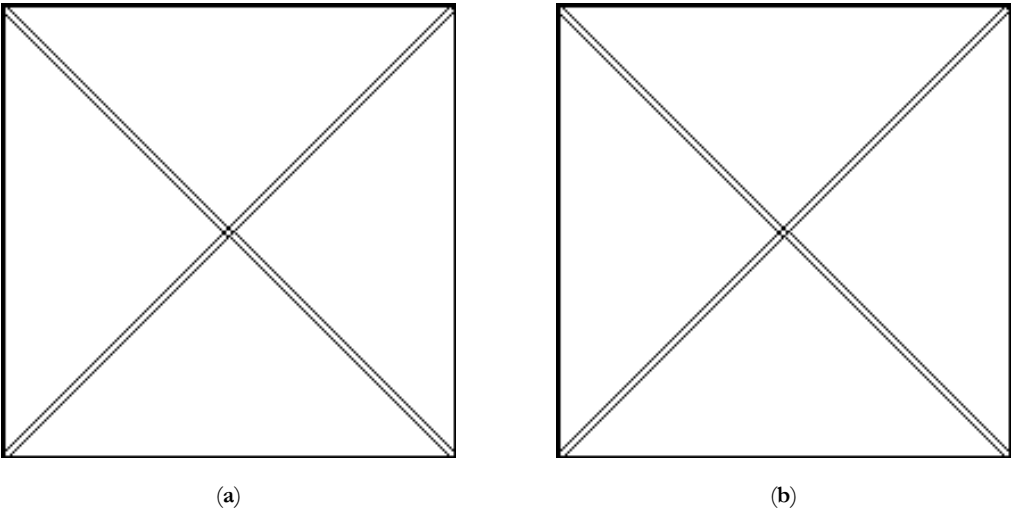
