1. Travel Risk Updates for the TCU Global Gathering 2026

Due to recent policy shifts and socio-political climates in some regions, participants should be aware of evolving risks when planning travel to Portugal for the **TCU Global Gathering 2026**. The following updates are particularly relevant to those traveling from or through regions where civil society actors, activists, and developers may face scrutiny or discrimination:

- **Portugal border controls:** While Portugal remains generally welcoming, recent government actions have tightened immigration enforcement, including a planned expulsion of undocumented migrants and increased scrutiny at entry points. Participants should anticipate stricter questioning and carry **printed copies of invitation letters, hotel reservations, return flights, and proof of funding** for their stay. [Source.](#)
- **EU Entry/Exit System (EES):** Portugal is using the EU Entry/Exit System (EES), which applies to non-EU nationals traveling to Schengen countries for short stays, meaning up to 90 days within any 180-day period. EES largely replaces manual passport stamping with digital records of entries and exits. Depending on your nationality and visa status, the process may include collecting biometric data, such as a facial image and, for some travelers, fingerprints. This may also increase processing time at border control, especially during peak travel periods. Participants of the Global Gathering should allow extra time for immigration procedures, follow posted airport instructions, and review the official EES information before traveling. Since EES involves sensitive biometric and personal data, participants with specific privacy, legal, or security concerns should consult their organization, legal counsel, or the relevant official EES data-protection information before departure. - **European transit hubs:** Although Portugal is the final destination, **transiting through European countries like France, Germany, or the Netherlands** may also involve **heightened immigration checks**. Be prepared to explain your itinerary and purpose of travel, and carry supporting documents, even if not required for visa-free transit. [Source.](#)
- **Avoid transiting through the U.S.:** Due to increased anti-immigration rhetoric and unpredictable border behavior in the United States, participants, especially those from the Global Majority or with activist profiles, are strongly advised to avoid routing flights through U.S. airports if alternatives are available.

2. Before You Travel

a. General Considerations

- Ensure your home is secure while you are away.
- Inform a trusted individual of your flight information, where you will stay, and your emergency contact abroad.
- If you hold a bank account, notify your credit card company of your intent to travel.
- Pack any medication and prescriptions you may need in your carry-on.
- Print a hard copy of your travel itinerary, passport copy, visa information, invitation letter, hotel reservation, and keep it with you in your carry-on.
- Consider traveling with a portable charger or backup battery for devices. **Note:** Some airlines prohibit power banks on board. Please check your airline's policy in advance and plan accordingly.
- Do not post your travel destination or check-in on social media in real time, as it alerts others that you are not home and also reveals your current location.
- Keep electronic copies (or take digital photos) of your passport and visa, credit cards, and other documents that may need to be replaced quickly if lost or stolen.
- If possible, arrange for travel health insurance coverage.
- Try to carry cash with you since many places will prefer it over cards, or cash would be the only payment method available. Euros are the only accepted currency in Portugal. If you anticipate that your local currency will be difficult to exchange in Portugal, try to exchange it before you arrive. Current [exchange rate here](#). Please note that airport exchange desks and ATMs may apply their own fees or rates. When carrying cash, be extra mindful of pickpockets, and store your wallets in a zippered bag or in a front pocket.
- Research the location and contact information for your consulate or embassy before you travel.
- Ensure your mobile phone has roaming capabilities for emergency use, OR obtain a local SIM card upon arrival for in-country communication (**Note:** the local SIM will not work unless your phone is unlocked. You can also bring a backup mobile).
- Confirm you have adequate credit on your local mobile phone.
- Consider using e-SIM providers (e.g., [Airalo](#), [Holafly](#)) as a cheap and convenient alternative to a local SIM card.

- Establish a check-in procedure with a team member not traveling with you at specific intervals during your trip.
- Stay informed about local conditions. Recent incidents, such as power outages and transportation disruptions, have occurred in Portugal and neighboring countries. Travelers should stay informed about local conditions and have contingency plans. [Source](#).
- Review current passport, health, transit, and visa requirements for your destination using the [IATA Travel Centre](#). This tool provides up-to-date information based on your nationality and travel route.

b. Local Emergency Contacts

- **For urgent matters in Portugal, call the emergency number 112.** Most operators speak some English.

If you are having a medical emergency, you can call **112** or go directly to the nearest hospital. Check out this list of [Hospitals in Portugal](#). Note that Portugal also has a Healthline (known as SNS 24) that can be used to obtain general medical advice regarding minor issues: +351 808 24 24 24. **Note:** If you are calling and experience connectivity issues, you can also visit sns24.gov.pt for online services or to access support via the **MySNS app**.

c. Local Laws

VPN: There are no laws against using a VPN for legal purposes in Portugal.

Alcohol: Consumption is legal in Portugal, but local restrictions may apply in some municipalities, public spaces, transport settings, hotels, or event venues. Participants should follow venue rules, avoid disruptive public behavior, and use care when moving around late at night.

LGBTQ+: Same-sex relations are legal in Portugal, and discrimination based on gender identity and sexual orientation is illegal. [Source](#).

Drugs: If you travel with prescription medication, carry it in its original packaging and bring a copy of the prescription. In Portugal, possession of drugs for personal consumption is generally

treated as an administrative offense rather than a criminal offense. However, it remains prohibited and can still lead to police intervention, confiscation, referral to administrative authorities, or other consequences. Drug trafficking, supply, and cultivation remain criminal offenses. [Source](#).

3. During Travel

a. General considerations

- Do not pack prohibited items and/or items that may be seen as suspicious or contrary to either your home government or the government of Portugal.
- Avoid storing valuables such as laptops, cell phones, money, and jewelry in checked luggage. Distribute valuables within your carry-on, keeping cash and credit cards separate to mitigate theft risk.
- Always keep essential items with you (passport, electronic devices).
- Attach luggage tags to checked bags, omitting sensitive personal info (address, work email, job title, company). Do not openly display this information anywhere on your luggage.
- Confirm with the ticketing agent that your luggage has been checked through to the final destination. On some flight routes, you may need to collect your baggage, go through border control or customs, and re-check your bags before your next flight.
- Avoid sharing unnecessary details about travel plans, hotel, meetings, etc, during transit conversations. In addition, do not share your information or the purpose of your trip unnecessarily with strangers.
- While Portugal is generally safe, it is wise not to count cash in public or discuss it openly.
- Keep your devices well-charged. Some flights do not have charging ports, so it is recommended that you bring a power bank so that you will not be without power when you land.
- Upon entering the country, be prepared to discuss travel purposes, duration, accommodations, etc., if immigration authorities inquire. Avoid carrying sensitive items that could prompt further questioning or searches. **Review additional Border Crossing Considerations.**

b. Border Crossing Considerations

This information is shared solely to assist with border crossing considerations. The final decision regarding an individual's entry into a foreign country lies with local authorities. If you have inquiries or apprehensions regarding your international travel, please do not hesitate to reach out for assistance and contact gather@digitalrights.community.

Mitigating Risk of Detention or Arrest



While some of the risks associated with detention or arrest at a border crossing are not within an individual's control, some actions can be taken to minimize the risk and prepare for potential inquiries or requirements:

- **Research all entry and exit requirements:** Familiarize yourself with entry and exit requirements, and ensure essential materials like visa information, insurance, accommodation details, invitation letters, and registration certificates are printed out prior to travel, which can aid in case of border scrutiny.
- **No photographs:** Do not take pictures at airports or of official government/military installations in any country. Delete any such photos from your phone before crossing borders or checkpoints.
- **Backup of critical documents:** Always maintain photocopies and digital backups of key travel materials such as your passport or national identification card.
- **Purpose of travel:** Clearly articulate your travel purpose and be ready to provide supporting information if officials request it. This includes explaining your entry or departure rationale and the applicable visa type.
- **Attitude:** Remain polite and courteous with all immigration officials. Remember that they are ultimately in control of border crossings.
- **Sensitive materials:** Do not travel with any materials or items that may be illegal or sensitive in another country.

In the Case of Questioning, Arrest, or Detention

The following recommendations offer guidance to consider in the event of an arrest or detention situation during international travel:

- Stay calm and avoid getting defensive or angry with authorities.
- Ensure you retain possession of your identification documents and request to hold onto them. If declined, avoid resistance.
- Ask for a translator if you do not speak the local language.
- If further engagement or responses are required, request to consult with legal counsel. Avoid signing anything without legal consultation and a translation in a language you understand.
- Ask for communication to be made with your Embassy.
- Exercise caution before immediately handing over personal belongings (such as a laptop, tablet, cell phone, luggage, wallet). If requested, politely inquire about the authority to confiscate. If insistence persists, comply.

- If devices are retained/confiscated and you believe they might have been searched without your presence or awareness, try to check the times when they were taken and returned to you.
- Attempt to note down the names and contact details of the authorities overseeing your case.

RETURNING TO THE UNITED STATES (non-U.S. citizens)

U.S. Customs & Border Protection (CBP) officers may inspect your luggage and the full contents of your electronic devices without a warrant at any port of entry, using advanced forensic searches that can copy your data and keep it for up to 15 years. Non-U.S. citizens may face additional immigration consequences if they refuse to comply with inspection requests, including secondary inspection, device seizure, denial of admission, or other immigration action, depending on their status and circumstances. Because U.S. border-search rules and practices can change, travelers should review current CBP guidance and consult an immigration lawyer if they have specific concerns before departure. How to prepare:

- Travel, if possible, with a "clean" or loaner device.
- Back up and remove sensitive files; keep the device encrypted and powered off while in transit.
- Review social media content, including saved items (e.g., posts, memes, videos), especially if they may be perceived as political or critical of U.S. policies.
- Sign out of, or uninstall, social-media and messaging apps you don't need.
- Disable biometric unlock, and use a strong password instead.
- Carry hard-copy proof of status (I-20/DS-2019, EAD, green card).
- If taken to secondary inspection, stay calm, ask to call an attorney, and note the officer's badge number.
- **Regulations change quickly;** consult the latest CBP policy or an immigration lawyer before departure. Good resources include the FAQ [EFF Border-Search Pocket Guide](#), and the ACLU's [Enforcement at the Airport](#).

c. On Arrival

- **Exchange money:** Before you leave the airport, exchange some money into local currency (at least double the amount of a taxi fare).

- **ATM and currency exchange:** Cash can be taken out at ATMs inside the airport, and other currencies can be exchanged at the airport if you arrive during the day.
- **Taxis:** Taxis from Lisbon Airport are generally reliable and trustworthy. Most taxis do not accept credit cards, so you must pay in cash. The cost of a taxi from Lisbon Airport to Estoril (Fiartil) is around 30 Euros, but it may be more or less depending on traffic. Make sure to ask to put on the meter. A luggage supplement may apply; the current taxi tariff reference lists this supplement at **€1.60**, but participants should check the displayed fare information in the taxi and ask the driver if unsure. - **Wi-Fi and SIM cards:** Free Wi-Fi is available at the airport and in many restaurants and cafes. Temporary data or phone SIM cards can be purchased from any major provider (MEO, Vodafone, NOS). There is a Vodafone vendor in the airport arrivals area. For more information about the internet in Portugal, visit: [Internet in Portugal](#).
- **Risk of Pickpocketing at Lisbon Airport:** Pickpockets have been known to operate actively in and around Lisbon Airport. We advise all travelers to remain vigilant upon arrival.
- **Ground travel options:**
 - Metro and Bus:** More information is available on [Rome2Rio](#). Schedules, prices, and service disruptions should be confirmed with the transport provider before travel.
 - Uber/Bolt:** Uber and Bolt are available from the airport, but less easy to locate. The pick-up area is in the P2 parking garage, and the Kiss&Fly area near departures.

d. Once in the Hotel

Ensure the safety of your belongings by following these precautions during your stay:

- Stay close to your luggage during check-in and keep your personal bag or backpack within reach.
- While checking in, avoid loudly sharing your name and reservation details. If your room number is mentioned aloud, consider requesting a different room or call the front desk for a change after settling in.
- Remove the sleeve containing your name and room number from the room key and keep them separate.
- Acquaint yourself with your room and floor, noting phone locations, the presence of connecting doors, window locks, fire exits, and escape routes.
- Avoid leaving housekeeping requests on your door, as this signals the room is unoccupied. Instead, call for housekeeping when needed.

e. Securing Tech and High-Value Items while Traveling

Whether traveling internationally or around a city, it is critical to safeguard your technology. Device and valuable theft are a global concern, irrespective of location. The practices below empower you to enhance security for you and your possessions as you navigate event venues, towns, flights, or local trips.

Only travel with work devices (i.e., laptop, phone, tablet) or other devices when your organization explicitly approves. Items are safest in the office or personal homes and least safe in transit. If you are carrying high-value items or technology, consider these mitigation measures:

- **Be aware of your surroundings.**

Never leave devices and high-value belongings alone, even for a short period of time. Avoid publicly showing off your phone, tablet, or laptop, or taking it out in unfamiliar places. Keep them out of sight of others and store them in a non-transparent bag.

- **Secure your equipment.**

Devices should be fully powered down and not kept in 'sleep' or 'hibernation' mode when not in use. They should also be powered down before leaving the home or office.

- **Exercise caution on public transport.**

Whenever possible, avoid using work-sponsored devices or high-value items on public transportation. If unavoidable, travel before sunset to avoid using equipment after dark. Keep items close, ideally on your lap, and hidden from others' view.

As a last resort, if items must be left in a vehicle briefly, ensure doors are locked, covered, securely stowed, and well out of sight. Confirm doors and windows are locked when leaving.

- **All high-value/work-sponsored devices must be password-protected and encrypted to protect personal and confidential data.**

What are low, medium, and high risk areas?

Low Risk: Basic security measures are sufficient in most cases.

Medium Risk: Risk level is elevated due to factors like increased cybercrime rates, potential for targeted attacks, or the presence of organized threat actors.

High Risk: These areas are characterized by high cybercrime rates, advanced security threats, and potential for surveillance by malicious actors. Comprehensive security measures are necessary to mitigate risks.

It is important to note that individual risk factors, such as the nature of the attendees' work, personal connections, and the sensitivity of the information we manipulate, can also influence the overall risk level.

The key is to assess your risk level based on your origin and take appropriate steps to mitigate threats. Consult with our security professionals if you have specific concerns. Stay vigilant and prioritize protecting sensitive data and communications.

Make a habit of ensuring your files are stored in the cloud so that, in the event of a loss or theft, you only lose the hardware. Record your devices' serial numbers and store them in a safe place. Serial numbers can be used to identify your belongings in the event a device is stolen and later found. If your device is lost or stolen, remember to report it to the police if possible.

4. Re-entering sensitive countries

Political contexts: Participants traveling from countries with restrictive laws, particularly LGBTQ+ activists or those working in human rights, may face additional scrutiny when traveling or upon return. While the TCU Global Gathering is a non-political, community-based event, we recommend the following precautions:

- **Re-entering countries with autocratic governments.** Activists returning to their home countries may be questioned about their participation. If needed, you may request an anonymized confirmation of attendance from the Global Gathering team.
 - Prepare template answers for “Why were you in Portugal?” (e.g., for a tech community event, not a political gathering). For example: “I attended a community event on digital tools and learning.”
- **Consider additional precautions.** If you anticipate risks due to your identity or professional background. If you have questions or concerns, don't hesitate to contact our support team before or after your trip.

5. Digital Security

Understanding your personal risk level: The local security risk in Portugal may be low, but each participant's personal risk may differ. Your risk level may depend on your country of origin, nationality, immigration status, public visibility, professional role, affiliations, communities you support, and whether authorities may scrutinize you upon your return home. Participants who are unsure about their risk level should contact the Global Gathering security team before traveling at gather@digitalrights.community.

Low Risk. You do not expect additional scrutiny during travel or upon return, and your devices are not considered to contain sensitive information.

- **Keep devices secure.** Always keep your devices with you and avoid leaving them unattended in public places.
- **Be wary of suspicious emails.** Be cautious of emails related to your travel, especially if they contain links or attachments. Verify the source before opening.
- **Keep your devices updated with the latest security patches and features.** This means regularly updating your operating system, browser, and other software. However, try not to perform

these updates while connected to untrusted networks, such as airport Internet. Just as you should be suspicious of unusual emails, be cautious of updating your devices on public or untrusted Wi-Fi networks to prevent potential security risks.

- **Use strong, unique passwords for all accounts and store them in a password manager.** These tools can also help you create complex passwords. To add an extra layer of security, enable two-factor authentication (2FA) wherever possible, and avoid using SMS as your second factor.
- **Be cautious of public Wi-Fi networks and consider using a VPN.** Public Wi-Fi networks can be vulnerable to surveillance and hacking. Consider using a Virtual Private Network (VPN) to encrypt your internet connection and protect your data.
- **Avoid accessing sensitive accounts or information on public computers.** Public computers can be compromised with malware or keyloggers. Avoid accessing sensitive accounts or information on public computers.
- **Back up your data regularly in case your devices are lost or stolen.** Regularly back up your data to a secure location, such as an external hard drive or cloud storage service, to ensure you can recover your data in case your devices are lost or stolen.

Medium Risk. You may face increased scrutiny because of your work, public profile, nationality, organizational affiliation, or the type of data you carry.

- **Use a dedicated travel device.** Consider using a separate device for travel that has minimal sensitive information stored on it.
- **Enable full disk encryption.** Encrypt your device's hard drive to protect data in case of loss or theft.
- **Avoid discussing sensitive topics in public.** Refrain from discussing sensitive topics, such as business or personal secrets, in public places where you may be overheard.
- **Encrypt sensitive data on your devices and use full disk encryption if possible.** Windows users can use [BitLocker](#) or Device Encryption; Mac users can use [FileVault](#); and participants who need a cross-platform, open-source option may consider [VeraCrypt](#). If you use an organization-managed device, confirm encryption settings with your IT or security team before travel.
- **Be extra vigilant for shoulder surfers and eavesdroppers when accessing sensitive information.** Be aware of your surroundings when accessing sensitive information, such as passwords or financial data. Avoid sharing sensitive information in public places.
- **Consider using a privacy screen filter on your devices.** Use a privacy screen filter to prevent others from viewing your screen, which can help protect sensitive information.



High Risk. You may face targeted questioning, surveillance, device searches, harassment, detention, or retaliation because of your work, identity, public visibility, or country context.

- **Encrypt communications.** Use end-to-end encrypted messaging apps like Signal or WhatsApp to protect your communications from interception.
- **Be aware of potential surveillance.** Be mindful of potential physical surveillance and take countermeasures such as using secure communication methods and avoiding discussing sensitive topics in public.
- **Be prepared for the possibility of device seizure or interrogation at borders.** Be ready for the possibility of device seizure or interrogation at borders, and have a plan in place for how to handle such situations.
- **Consider using a burner phone to minimize risk to your primary devices.** If you need to use a device in a medium-risk area, consider using a burner phone that can be easily disposed of or wiped clean if compromised. Use a dedicated secure device for travel that is wiped clean before and after the trip to minimize the risk of data compromise.
- **Consider leaving sensitive devices at home and only bringing what is absolutely necessary to minimize the risk of data compromise.**

6. Using AI Tools Safely Before and During the Global Gathering

AI tools can be useful for planning travel, translating simple text, drafting non-sensitive messages, organizing notes, or preparing logistics. However, these tools can also create security and privacy risks if participants share sensitive information, connect accounts without reviewing permissions, or use automated meeting tools without consent. If you need to use AI tools before or during the Global Gathering, restrict their use to low-sensitivity tasks and apply the precautions below.

Use Substitution Rules

Do not enter personal, sensitive, unique, or confidential information into AI tools unless your organization has explicitly approved that tool and use case. Avoid uploading or pasting:

- Passports, visas, national IDs, or immigration documents;
- Invitation letters, hotel bookings, travel itineraries, or flight details;
- Participant lists, private contact details, or badge information;
- Private Signal, WhatsApp, email, or group chat messages;
- Internal event documents, agenda, security plans, incident reports, or risk assessments;
- Personal stories, case details, legal concerns, or politically sensitive information;
- API keys, passwords, recovery codes, tokens, or other credentials.



When possible, replace sensitive details with generic placeholders. For example, use “Participant A,” “Country X,” “the hotel,” or “the event venue” instead of real names, locations, organizations, or identifying details. [Source.](#)

Be Careful with AI Transcription, Summaries, and Translation

Do not use AI transcription tools, meeting assistants, note-takers, or automatic summaries in sessions, side meetings, private conversations, or informal gatherings unless everyone present has clearly agreed. Be especially careful with AI translation tools when discussing sensitive personal, political, legal, organizational, or security-related information. Translation tools can help with general communication, but they may process or retain the text you enter depending on the tool’s settings and policies. Treat AI outputs as drafts, not verified guidance. [Source.](#)

Do not rely on AI tools as the final source for legal, immigration, medical, visa, security, or emergency decisions.

Minimize Data Retention and Training

Review the privacy settings of any AI tool you use. Where available.

- Opt out of having your data used to train models.
- Turn off chat history or memory features when handling anything sensitive.
- Reduce data retention as much as possible.
- Regularly delete chats, uploaded files, and generated outputs that you no longer need.

Privacy settings can reduce risk, but they do not make sensitive sharing automatically safe. Use them with intention, not casually. [Source.](#)

Segment Your Identity and Tools

Avoid linking all AI tools to your real identity, main email address, work account, or primary device. When possible, separate tools and accounts by task and sensitivity level.

For higher-sensitivity work, use privacy-focused tools, organization-approved systems, or local/offline AI tools when appropriate. For routine writing, planning, or low-risk tasks, use tools with privacy settings enabled and avoid sharing identifying details. For low-sensitivity tasks, common AI tools may be appropriate if you still apply basic privacy precautions.

As a general rule, align the tool with the task. Do not use the same AI setup for casual travel planning, sensitive security work, private participant information, and organizational documents.

During the Event

Do not upload event materials, session notes, photos, recordings, participant information, or private conversations into AI tools without permission. Do not use AI tools to identify, profile, summarize, or analyze other participants.



If you are unsure whether a tool or use case is safe, avoid entering the information and contact your organization's security team or the Global Gathering security contact for guidance.
