◆ **.5 Credit Courses (1 Semester/Half Year)**

- American Sign Language A (47901):** This course is designed to teach students the basics of American Sign Language (ASL), emphasizing both expressive and receptive skills. It will also introduce students to Deaf culture and its history.
- Art 1/Foundations 1 (11000):** Use of traditional 2-D art media such as drawing, painting, and/or printmaking.
- Art 2/Foundations 2: (Pre-requisite Art 1) (11050)** Provides an enhanced experience with artistic issues of Art 1 through two-dimensional art that is not usually included with drawing, painting, and/or printmaking.
- Visual Arts (Pre-requisite Art 1 & Art 2) (10801)** – This course provides an overview of basic design principles and an introduction to fine crafts, their media, and the culture they represent. Students will develop basic understanding of media specific technical skills.
- Beginning Choir (16201):** Students will learn how to read sheet music, define musical terms, and express artistry through music. Students will be required to participate in all concerts and performances.
- General Music (16000):** This is a non-performing, music appreciation class. This course will introduce students to the “ingredients” of music such as melody, harmony, notation, texture, styles, rhythm, and form. It also will provide a wide variety of music experiences, including how music is created, various genres of music, how music is written, and a basic study of music history and culture. It also will provide an overview of jobs included in the music industry.
- Life Management (93103-SHC):** This class emphasizes social and emotional learning to support students as they become young adults.
- Advanced Debate: (Pre-requisite Debate 1) (94050)** This course further develops skills in communication, logic, and reasoning learned in Debate 1. Students continue to refine diction, articulation, enunciation and projection skills while applying more advanced techniques of public speaking.
- Design and Modeling-Exploring Tech A (86301):** Students discover the design process and develop an understanding of the influence of creativity and innovation in their lives. They are then challenged and empowered to use and apply what they’ve learned throughout the unit to design a therapeutic toy for a child who has cerebral palsy.
- Automation and Robotics-Exploring Tech B (86302)** – Students track the history, development, and influence of automation and robotics. They learn about mechanical systems, energy transfer, machine automation, and computer control systems. Students use a robust robotics platform to design, build, and program a solution to solve an existing problem.
- Peer Tutor (90101):** Peer tutors are “mini” teachers in that they provide support or assistance for students with disabilities in various settings in the school and in the community. Peer tutors help teach students academic skills, social skills, daily living skills, and basic functioning skills.
- Beginning Weight Training (78001):** This course is designed to teach basic concepts in weight training as a lifelong activity for healthy lifestyles. This course covers basic concepts in anatomy, physiology, and nutrition as it pertains to weight training and muscle development. Students are given the opportunity to learn the major muscles of the body, how they work, and how we can make them stronger. Students learn proper, efficient, and safe training/lifting techniques.

Intermediate Choir (17201): This class is for students with at least one-year experience singing in a choir. Students will be required to participate in all concerts and performances.

◆ **1 Credit Courses (2 Semesters/Full Year)**

Beginning Band – Brass (16420): Students will learn how to play such instruments as the trumpet, trombone, and tuba. Students may bring their own instrument to play. Others without instruments will play what is available. Students will be required to participate in all concerts and performances.

Beginning Band – Woodwinds (16411): Students will learn how to play such instruments as the clarinet, oboe, and flute. Students may bring their own instrument to play. Others without instruments will play what is available. Students will be required to participate in all concerts and performances.

Beginning Band – Percussion (16301): Students will learn how to play such instruments as the drum, triangle, and xylophone. Students may bring their own instrument to play. Others without instruments will play what is available. Students will be required to participate in all concerts and performances.

Intermediate Band (By Audition): For students who have taken at least one year of Band or Orchestra. Students who sign up for this class will continue to learn more advanced techniques on their instruments. Students will be required to participate in all concerts and performances.

Beginning Orchestra (16601): Students will have the opportunity to play the violin, viola, cello, or bass. Students may bring their own instrument to play, others without instruments will play what is available.

Intermediate Orchestra (by audition-16651): For students who have taken at least one year of Band or Orchestra. Students who sign up for this class will continue to learn more advanced techniques on their instruments. Students will be required to participate in all concerts and performances.

Spanish 1 (47011): This class focuses on extending the material from the Introduction Spanish class. This class begins learning to use Spanish verbs and more complicated grammar. For the native Spanish speaker, the class continues to teach reading and writing and to improve a student's academic vocabulary in Spanish.

AVID 8 (application process required) (94092): Advanced Via Individual Determination (AVID) is an academic elective course that prepares students for college readiness, preparation for college entrance, study skills, test-taking strategies, and note-taking. This course also focuses on team building strategies and community network and support.

LIA (application process required) 78371): Members of Latinos in Action will work at a local elementary school to help children in various core academic areas and support community events. They also receive training in leadership, teaching methods, mentoring, job skills, and college preparation.
