Amberley, like all English towns and villages, was originally a Roman Catholic community until Henry VIII's time, since when the parish church has been Church of England, and the village school was founded as a Church of England School, as it still is. But from [date] until [date] the village had a thriving Congregational Church, which at one point possibly had more members than the parish church. Roman Catholics in Amberley could walk to St Edmund's Church in Houghton. For a short time [dates] there was a Buddhist community at Oak Tree House.
