Old New York: Colloquial 2040 term referring to the remains of New York City.

An <u>Earthship</u> is a brand of <u>passive solar</u> <u>earth shelter</u> that is made of both natural and <u>upcycled</u> materials such as earth-packed <u>tires</u>, pioneered by architect <u>Michael Reynolds</u>.

Earthships address six basic human needs through environmentally sustainable building design:

Energy: Thermal and/or solar heating and cooling, solar and wind electricity

Garbage Management: Reuse and recycling built into construction and daily living

Sewage Treatment: Self-contained sewage treatment and water recycling

Shelter: Building with natural and recycled materials

Clean Water: Water harvesting and long term storage

Food: In-home organic food production capability

Forest gardening is a low-maintenance, <u>sustainable</u>, plant-based food production and <u>agroforestry</u> system based on <u>woodland ecosystems</u>, incorporating <u>fruit</u> and <u>nut trees</u>, <u>shrubs</u>, <u>herbs</u>, <u>vines</u> and <u>perennial vegetables</u> which have <u>yields</u> directly useful to humans. Making use of <u>companion planting</u>, these can be <u>intermixed</u> to grow in a succession of layers to build a woodland habitat. Forest <u>gardening</u> is a <u>prehistoric</u> method of securing food in <u>tropical areas</u>.

Agroforestry is a <u>land use</u> management system in which trees or shrubs are grown around or among crops or pastureland. This intentional combination of agriculture and <u>forestry</u> has varied benefits, including increased biodiversity and reduced erosion.

<u>Companion planting</u> in gardening and agriculture is the planting of different crops in proximity for any of a number of different reasons, including <u>pest control</u>, <u>pollination</u>, providing <u>habitat</u> for <u>beneficial insects</u>, maximizing use of space, and to otherwise increase <u>crop productivity</u>.[1] Companion planting is a form of <u>polyculture</u>. (<u>Learn more</u>)

<u>The Metaverse</u> is a collective virtual shared space, created by the convergence of virtually enhanced physical reality and physically persistent virtual space, [1] including the sum of all <u>virtual worlds</u>, <u>augmented reality</u>, and the <u>Internet</u>. The word "metaverse" is a <u>portmanteau</u> of the prefix "<u>meta</u>" (meaning beyond) and "<u>universe</u>"; the term is typically used to describe the concept of a future iteration of the internet, made up of persistent, shared, 3D virtual spaces linked into a perceived virtual universe.[2]

<u>Virtual reality (VR)</u> is a <u>simulated</u> experience that can be similar to or completely different from the real world. <u>Applications of virtual reality</u> can include entertainment (i.e. <u>video games</u>) and educational purposes (i.e. medical or military training). Other, distinct types of VR style technology include <u>augmented reality</u> and <u>mixed reality</u>.

<u>Oya</u> (<u>Yoruba</u>: Oya, also known as **Oyá** or **Oiá**; **Yansá** or **Yansã**; and **Iansá** or **Iansã** in <u>Latin</u> <u>America</u>) is an <u>orisha</u> of winds, lightning, and violent storms, death and rebirth. She is similar to the <u>Haitian</u> god <u>Maman Brigitte</u>, who is syncretised with the Catholic <u>Saint Brigit</u>. She is also known as Mariwanga in Congolese Kimpungulu. In <u>Yoruba</u>, the name Oya means "she tore." She is the patron of the <u>Niger River</u> (known to the <u>Yoruba</u> as the Odo-Oya)

Ayni (Quechua, also spelled Ayniy or Aini) can refer to either the concept of reciprocity or mutualism among people of the Andean mountain communities or the practice of this concept. [1] As a noun, the law of ayni states that everything in the world is connected, and is the only commandment that rules daily life in many communities like the Q'ero. [2] As a verb, this often refers to the cooperation between the members of a community when one member gives to another, he or she is entitled to receive something back.

<u>Wetiko</u> is an Algonquin word for a cannibalistic spirit that is driven by greed, excess, and selfish consumption (in Ojibwa it is windigo, wintiko in Powhatan). It deludes its host into believing that cannibalizing the life-force of others (others in the broad sense, including animals and other forms of Gaian life) is a logical and morally upright way to live.

A <u>hoverbike</u> (or **hovercycle**) is a vehicle that can <u>hover</u>, but that otherwise resembles a <u>motorbike</u>, mainly by having at least two propulsive portions—one in front of and one behind the driver.
