

Instructions for Authors (updated 2024)

Aims and Scope. *Coastal Management* is an international peer-reviewed, applied research journal dedicated to exploring the technical, applied ecological, legal, political, social, and policy issues relating to the use of coastal and ocean resources and environments on a global scale. The journal presents timely information on management tools and techniques as well as recent findings from research and analysis that bear directly on management and policy. Findings must be grounded in the current peer reviewed literature and relevant studies. Articles must contain a clear and relevant management component. Preference is given to studies of interest to an international readership, but case studies are accepted if conclusions are derived from acceptable evaluative methods, reference to comparable cases, and related to peer reviewed studies.

Submission of Manuscripts. Authors should submit manuscripts electronically via email to coastjnl@uw.edu. The manuscript should be prepared in a Microsoft Word (.doc or .docx) format and the file should be clearly labeled with the lead author's name and manuscript file name. Each manuscript must be accompanied by a statement that it has not been published elsewhere and that it has not been submitted simultaneously for publication elsewhere. Translations of papers previously published in languages other than English can be considered, but this information must be provided by the author at the time of submission. Authors are responsible for obtaining permission to reproduce copyrighted material from other sources and are required to sign an agreement for the transfer of copyright to the publisher. As an author, you are required to secure permission if you want to reproduce any figure, table, or extract from the text of another source. This applies to direct reproduction as well as 'derivative reproduction' (where you have created a new figure or table which derives substantially from a copyrighted source). The use of Artificial Intelligence (AI) is regulated by the publisher's (Taylor and Francis) policies [here](#). See below for detailed guidance on use of AI. All accepted manuscripts, artwork, and photographs become the property of the publisher. All parts of the manuscript should be double-spaced with margins of at least one inch on all sides. Manuscript pages should be numbered consecutively throughout the paper.

Review Process. All journal articles are double blind peer reviewed. As such, all author identification information must be removable and separated from the manuscript's main text. The metadata associated with a file, such as the registered owner of software, will also identify the author and must be removed. To do so, delete 'User Name' under 'Word Options' or under 'Review' > 'Track Changes' > 'Change User Name' depending on Word version

Title. All titles should be as brief as possible, 6 to 12 words. Authors should also supply a shortened version of the title suitable for the running head, not exceeding 50 character spaces.

Affiliation. Include full names of authors, academic and/or other professional affiliations, and the complete mailing address, telephone and email address of the author to whom proofs and correspondence should be sent on the title page. Authors' names and affiliations should be separated with a page break from the manuscript text to facilitate removal prior to review.

Abstract and Keywords. Each paper should be summarized in an abstract of not more than 200 words. Avoid abbreviations, diagrams, references to the text, and citations. Authors must supply from three to five key words or phrases that identify the most important subjects covered by the paper.

Manuscript. CMJ does not place a page or word limit on manuscripts. We expect papers to be concise and clear. However, due to limits on the number of articles we can publish, there is a strong preference for full papers less

than 8000 words including citations, tables and figures. CMJ also welcomes the submission of short essays and reports (3000 word maximum length) which present a novel, distinctive, or even personal viewpoint on marine and coastal management. These may take the form of perspectives, commentaries, recent developments in marine and coastal policy, book reviews, and rejoinders critically examining articles published in the journal. These should be well grounded in evidence and adequately supported by citations.

Artificial Intelligence use: Taylor & Francis supports the responsible use of Generative AI tools that respect high standards of data security, confidentiality, and copyright protection in cases such as: Idea generation and idea exploration, language improvement, interactive online search with LLM-enhanced search engines, literature classification, coding assistance. Authors are responsible for ensuring that the content of their submissions meets the required standards of rigorous scientific and scholarly assessment, research and validation, and is created by the author. Authors must clearly acknowledge within the article or book any use of Generative AI tools through a statement which includes: the full name of the tool used (with version number), how it was used, and the reason for use. For article submissions, this statement must be included in the Methods or Acknowledgments section. Authors should not submit manuscripts where Generative AI tools have been used in ways that replace core researcher and author responsibilities, for example: text or code generation without rigorous revision, synthetic data generation to substitute missing data without robust methodology, generation of any types of content which is inaccurate including abstracts or supplemental materials. Taylor & Francis currently does not permit the use of Generative AI in the creation and manipulation of images and figures, or original research data for use in our publications. Utilizing Generative AI and AI-assisted technologies in any part of the research process should always be undertaken with human oversight and transparency.

References. Within text, references should be cited by author(s) and date in parentheses; the reference list should be arranged alphabetically.

In-text citations and the reference list should be prepared in accordance with the Chicago Manual of Style, 15th ed. Examples:

Illustrations. Illustrations submitted (line drawings, halftones, photos, photomicrographs, etc.) should be clean originals or digital files.

Digital files are recommended for highest quality reproduction. To facilitate review by email which prohibits sending of large files, figures with the initial (pre review) submission should be less than 70 dpi. After review and for publication, figures should follow these guidelines:

- 300 dpi or higher
- sized to fit on journal page
- JPEG, EPS, or TIFF, format only
- submitted as separate files, not embedded in text files

Color Reproduction. Color art will be reproduced in color in the online publication at no additional cost to the author. Color illustrations will also be considered for print publication; however, the author will be required to bear the full cost involved in color art reproduction. Please note that color reprints can only be ordered if print reproduction costs are paid. Print Rates: \$900 for the first page of color; \$450 per page for each of the next three pages of color. A custom quote will be provided for articles with more than four pages of color. Art not supplied at a minimum of 300 dpi will not be considered for print.

Tables and Figures. Tables and figures should not be embedded in the text, but should be included as separate pages or files. A short descriptive title should appear above each table and figure. Legends must be legible and any footnotes suitably identified below. All units must be included. Figures should take into account necessary size reduction for publication.

Page Proofs. All proofs must be corrected and mailed to the publisher within 48 hours of receipt. If the manuscript is not returned within the allotted time, the editor will proofread the article and it will be printed per his instruction. Only correction of typographical errors is permitted.

Reprints. Each corresponding author will receive a PDF file of the article via email. This file is for personal use only and may not be copied and disseminated in any form without prior written permission from Taylor and Francis. Reprints of individual articles are available for order at the time authors review page proofs. A discount is available to authors who order before print publication.

Submission of manuscripts in English. CMJ welcomes submission of manuscripts from authors whose primary language is not English. However, authors are strongly advised to obtain assistance to ensure that vernacular American English usage is achieved. At a minimum, use of the grammar and spell check functions available in word processing programs is expected. Free English writing apps are available (one option amongst many is Grammarly <https://www.grammarly.com/>) and can help avoid minor mistakes of usage. If additional assistance is needed, professional English language editors are available for a fee in most countries. Taylor and Francis publishers also offers a fee-based editorial service through its website (<https://www.tandfeditingservices.com/>). Experience shows that a well-edited manuscript is more likely to obtain favorable review than ones that use informal or incorrect English.
