provider who might be willing to do it. Reach out to your local syringe exchange programs or see if NHRC/NASEN have suggestions for you for where to look.

It is best practice to collect data on the naloxone that is distributed, people who are trained in overdose prevention/rescue, and reversals made. Consult folks on the OSNN listserv for the best format to use in your own data collection efforts. This data is needed because many County jurisdictions do not keep data on deaths due to accidental overdose.

This is not a comprehensive list of all vendors of harm reduction supplies - just the ones I know or have been exposed too. If you are not finding what you like with these suppliers, ask folks at your local syringe exchange program or from one of the training organizations mentioned above where to go.

Please know that some funding sources prohibit certain types of expenditures. There are sometimes workarounds. For example, if your organization does not want or cannot use funds for safe smoking

You pay the invoice with your organization funds to the syringe exchange program. This way there is no paper trail tying you to the purchase of the safe smoking equipment.</i>

There are pre-assembled wound care kits available through some of the vendors mentioned above (e.g. 1800safety2 and TAG). Those are totally fine to go with, but consider leaning on the advice of your participants and medical staff to help determine how to best create WC kits tailored to the type of wound being treated.</i>
