Sunday, June 5 (flights, check into hotel)

When you arrive, take a cab, uber, or lyft to Union South. Depending on the time of day, cabs may be lined up or you may need to call/use an app. One-way fare to Union South via cab should be no more than \$30; ride share services may vary. Though the bus system in Madison is fabulous for campus, it is NOT great for use from the airport and we do not recommend that you use it for airport transit.

2:00: Faculty Research: "Land, Loss, and Legacy: American Indians and the University of Wisconsin"--Kasey Keeler, 5th floor and walk

Dr. Keeler will discuss her current research through a brief lecture, and then lead a tour to parts of campus. This session will provide a brief presentation of Dr. Keeler's research and a walking tour of some relevant markers on campus: the statute of Abraham Lincoln atop Bascom Hill (a ritual at UW is for students to climb on Abe's lap for a photo opportunity when they graduate), the Our Shared Future Marker, effigy mounds, and Lake Mendota, which has significant to the Ho-Chunk.

*UW-Madison is located on the ancestral lands of the Ho-Chunk, who call this place <u>Teejop</u> or Dejope (day-Jope), which means Four Lakes and refers to the four lakes in this area: Mendota, Monona, Waubesa, and Kegonsa.

Like all 1862 Land Grant institutions that were either established or expanded by the Morrill Act, UW-Madison was made possible land (and the profit from that land) forcibly taken from Indigenous nations. For additional reading, see LandGrabUniversities. A second Morrill Act was passed in 1890 to establish or expand colleges and universities through a cash infusion; some are HBCUs today. It was not until 1994 that Congress recognized Tribal Colleges and Universities (TCUs) as Land Grant institutions.

Wisconsin Institute for Discovery (WID), 330 North Orchard St.

The WID is across the street from Union South. Meet at <u>Aldo's Cafe</u> for breakfast, an overview of the day's events, and view the exhibits on the first floor.

9:45: Virtual Reality CAVE (Cave Automatic Virtual Environment) Tour: WID Building **PLEASE FINISH AND DISPOSE OF FOOD PRIOR TO TOUR***

The fully immersive CAVE C6 is a room with four 9'6" x 9'6 walls, a ceiling and a floor — all of which are projection screens, except for the floor, which is a clear plexi-glass surface. Behind each projection screen are two projectors, which form 3D rear projected images on each screen. The system also has a 5.1 surround sound audio system and ceiling microphones for two-way communication to the development lab. The C6 uses Intersense head and wand tracking for full user-viewpoint-dependent stereoscopic (3D) viewing. Ultrasonic tracking sensors embedded into the CAVE corners provide full tracking of the head and wand. An IP-based camera is mounted in the rear of the CAVE with the ability to record and stream video of the happenings in the space to other parts of the Discovery Building. Design Studies faculty (Kevin Ponto) at the School of Human Ecology works most closely with this technology.

10:30: Board Bus at Union South: Waukesha and Milwaukee

Participants will take a day trip to Milwaukee to visit community partner and outreach sites. Locations will possibly include:

Waukesha: Dr. Alexander (NCAT, formerly a UW-Madison faculty member) has a partner research site there who can provide a brief overview of community-engaged research and action

Milwaukee: <u>Sherman Phoenix</u>. Sherman Phoenix is an entrepreneurial hub for Black-owned businesses, and serves as a model for community space that generates positive economic and social returns in communities of color. The building, support for businesses, and community efforts of Sherman Phoenix are a direct response to a police shooting of an unarmed Black man in the neighborhood in 2016.

We will eat lunch at one of the Sherman Phoenix businesses (and grab dessert from another).

<u>Madison's 3 cab companies</u> all have online advance booking options; for those of you leaving very early on Friday, consider booking your cab ride Thursday prior to noon.
