This work is by Cristine Georgina Bye. She received the Governor General's Gold Medal for her thesis paper and received a PhD and now works at the University of Calgary. This work describes the women being inferior to the men. As well, married women had absolutely no rights or shares against their husbands. They were under direct control of the male. Lange, Dorothea. *Migrant agricultural worker's family*. 1936. The History Place: Dorothea Lange. *Library of Congress*. Web. 26 Sept. 2012.

This photo is one taken from Dorothea Lange. Dorothea Lange was an influential American photographer who photographed many acclaimed photos. The photo is of a family, a mom and four kids, living out of a tent. They have practically no belongings and have clothes that are tore apart.
