

How Do I Find a Safe, Pet-Friendly Lawn Care Company in Frisco or Little Elm?

Your pets walk on treated grass, lick their paws, and sometimes eat grass. They lay in the yard. They dig. The products a lawn care company uses end up in direct contact with your family members, so asking about safety isn't being overprotective. It's being smart.

This guide walks you through what makes lawn care products safe or risky, what questions to ask any company before hiring them, and how to verify the answers you get are truthful.

Why This Question Matters

The lawn care industry uses products regulated by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and, in Texas, the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA). These regulations exist because improper use of herbicides, insecticides, and fertilizers can cause harm.

But here's the part most companies won't tell you: the risk isn't usually the product itself. The risk is how it's applied, who's applying it, and whether they're following label requirements.

A TDA-licensed applicator using professional-grade products correctly is safer than a homeowner applying store-bought products incorrectly. The difference is training, knowledge, and accountability.

What Makes Lawn Products Safe or Risky

EPA Registration Requirements

Every herbicide, insecticide, and fertilizer used by professional lawn care companies must be registered with the EPA. This means the product has been tested, the label provides specific safety instructions, and the manufacturer is held accountable for misuse.

When you ask a lawn care company what products they use, they should be able to name them. If they say "just fertilizer" or "standard treatments" without specifics, that's a red flag.

Professional companies use products like: - **Pre-emergent herbicides** (proflumicafene, pendimethalin) to stop weed seeds from sprouting - **Post-emergent herbicides** (2,4-D, dicamba) to kill actively growing weeds - **Insecticides** (bifenthrin, fipronil) for [fire ants](#), [grubs](#), and lawn pests - **Fungicides** (azoxystrobin, propiconazole) for [brown patch and other diseases](#)

These sound scary because they're chemicals. But so is caffeine, aspirin, and table salt. The question isn't "is it a chemical?" The question is "is it used correctly?"

The Difference Between Professional and Consumer Products

The products available at Home Depot or Lowe's are formulated for homeowners. They're designed to be safer if applied incorrectly (which homeowners often do), but they're also less effective.

Professional-grade products are stronger, work faster, and require proper training to apply. A TDA-licensed technician knows: - How much product to apply per 1,000 square feet - Which products damage St. Augustine grass vs Bermuda grass - What soil temperature activates pre-emergent herbicides - How wind speed affects spray drift - When re-entry is safe after application

Homeowners don't know these things. That's why misuse of consumer products causes more pet poisoning cases than professional applications.

Questions to Ask Any Lawn Care Company

Before you hire anyone, ask these questions. Their answers will tell you if they're professional or if they're winging it.

1. Are You TDA Licensed? What's Your License Number?

In Texas, anyone applying pesticides, herbicides, or fertilizers commercially must hold a valid license. No exceptions.

Ask for their license number and verify it at the TDA website:

2. What Products Do You Use?

They should be able to name specific products, not just categories. Good companies will provide a list of products on request.

3. What's the Re-Entry Time After Treatment?

The correct answer is: "Once the product has dried, typically 1-2 hours depending on weather."

4. Do You Provide Written Post-Treatment Instructions?

Professional companies leave information in writing: door hangers, yard signs (required by TDA), or digital notifications.

5. What Happens if My Pet Gets Sick After Treatment?

A good answer includes: they carry insurance, provide product labels on request, and will work with your vet if needed.

Understanding Re-Entry Time

This is the most important concept for pet safety.

Re-entry time is the period after treatment when the lawn should be off-limits to people and pets. For most lawn care products, that time is “once the product has dried.”

Typical Drying Times by Product Type

Product Type	Typical Drying Time	Safe Re-Entry
Liquid herbicide (weed control)	1-2 hours	Once dry
Liquid insecticide (fire ants, grubs)	1-2 hours	Once dry
Granular fertilizer	N/A (already dry)	After watering in, once grass dries
Granular pre-emergent	N/A (already dry)	After watering in, once grass dries
Fungicide spray	1-2 hours	Once dry

Signs It's Safe

Look for: - Grass is dry to the touch - No visible droplets or moisture - No chemical smell - At least 1-2 hours have passed since application

Red Flags to Watch For

- **No license or won't share license number** (illegal and dangerous)
- **Can't name products used** (incompetence or hiding something)
- **Promises “completely safe” with no explanation** (lying or ignorant)
- **No written post-treatment instructions** (violating state law)
- **Won't provide product labels or safety data sheets** (walk away)
