Lesson 2.3: Love, as a Fruit of the Spirit

Ages: 7-9

Goals

- Teach children that God is the source of love.
- Help them understand love as a fruit of the Holy Spirit.
- Encourage children to practice love in their everyday relationships.

Welcome Time

- Greet students as they arrive.
- Provide a "Love Is..." activity sheet where they can draw or write what love means to them.

Worship/Prayer Time: Click here

- Sing worship songs, such as:
 - o "Jesus Loves Me"
 - o "They'll Know We Are Christians by Our Love."
- Offer a prayer of thanksgiving for God's love and ask for His help in showing love to others.

Lesson

Introduction

Summary for Parents:

We introduced love as more than just a feeling—it's a deliberate action and choice. Students learned about agape love, which is selfless and unconditional, reflecting God's character. We discussed how love is a fruit of the Holy Spirit and a visible sign that someone is living for God.

- We compared love to fruit: just as fruit grows from a tree, love grows in our hearts when the Holy Spirit works in us.
- We talked about how the world often lacks love, but as children of God, we are called to love others regardless of how they treat us.

Opening Activities

- 1. Fruit Match-Up Game:
 - o Display pictures of different fruits with matching trees.
 - Discuss how the fruit represents the tree and how love represents a Christian's heart.
- 2. Love Brainstorm:
 - Ask students to define love in their own words.
 - Create a "Love Word Cloud" on the board, writing down all their ideas.

Memory Verse

Galatians 5:22-23

22 But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, 23 gentleness and self-control. Against such things there is no law.

Bible Story

- 1 Corinthians 13:4-8
 - Read the passage aloud or act it out as a group.
 - Discuss the characteristics of love:
 - Love is patient, kind, and truthful.
 - o Love is not jealous, boastful, or rude.
 - Love never gives up, always hopes, and never fails.
 - Show examples of these traits in everyday life (e.g., being patient with a sibling, helping a friend).

Discussion Questions

- 1. What is love, and how would you describe it?
- 2. How can you tell when someone is being loving?

3. What are some ways you can show love at home, school, or church?

Gospel Point

- God is the ultimate example of love. He sent Jesus to show His love for us by dying on the cross for our sins.
- When we believe in Jesus, the Holy Spirit helps us love others the way God loves us.

Activity (Visual Aids)

- 1. Fruit of Love Tree:
 - Provide each student with a paper cutout of a fruit.
 - Ask them to write or draw one way they can show love.
 - Attach the fruits to a large paper tree labeled "Fruit of Love."
- 2. Love Scenarios:
 - o Divide students into small groups.
 - Give each group a scenario (e.g., a friend is sad, a sibling takes your toy, or a classmate is left out).
 - Let them act out how they would show love in that situation.

Craft

Love Chain

- Materials: Construction paper strips, markers, tape or glue.
- Have students write one way they can show love on each strip, then link the strips together to form a "Love Chain" to hang in the classroom or take home.

Conclusion

Summary for Parents:

We wrapped up the lesson by emphasizing that love is the defining characteristic of a follower of Jesus. Like a tree is known by its fruit, Christians are known by the love they show to others.

- Students were encouraged to reflect on their actions and ensure they are showing love in all situations.
- We challenged them to think of ways to practice love daily, even when it's difficult.
