Most cities in South Africa like Cape Town and Johannesburg have cheaper living expenses compared to other mega-urban cities like London and Hong Kong. Generally, consumer prices in London are 96.4% higher than in Johannesburg without rent.

South Africa's high quality of digital life allows residents to have better access to the internet. This includes more affordable services, good internet quality, and great electronic infrastructure.

Compared to other countries in the African continent, South Africa scored the highest in the Digital Quality of Life Index in both 2021 and 2022. Globally, it ranked 66th out of 117 analysed nations, according to Statista.

3. It offers excellent private healthcare

4. It has unique traditional dishes

South Africa has a wide variety of cuisine across its many ethnic groups. The most popular ones are the Zulu traditional dishes, as it's the largest community in the country.

Its famous uphuthu, a maize meal created similarly to porridge but with a more crumbly texture, is a staple for every occasion. Usually, it's served with African spinach, milk or amasi (sour milk).

Cape breyani is another must-try dish from South Africa. It's from the Cape Malay cuisine with various layers of marinated meat, rice, lentils and spices garnished with crisp-fried onions and hard-boiled eggs.

As for delicious desserts, South Africans are described to have sweet tooths with large sugar consumption. According to the <u>World Health Organization</u>, residents consume an approximate amount of 24 teaspoons of sugar per day.

The most famous treats include Koeksisters, a deep-fried circular pastry dipped in syrup-like sugar, and melktert or also known as milk tart which is perfect for the summer.

5. It has a rich culture

7. It has a more relaxed work culture



9. It's abundant with natural resources


