ACTIVITY SUMMARY

In this activity, students will use the US Department of Transportation Map Gallery website to look and analyze different patterns revolving around transportation. Students will be able to get a better understanding of central concepts such as settlement, movement, migration, immigration, population characteristics, and population distribution. Focusing on these concepts, students will gain more geographical understanding and acquire geographic inquiry. This activity would be most beneficial towards middle school or high school students.

By the end of this activity, students will be able to:

- Use the US Department of Transportation Map Gallery website to be able to explore different maps and inquire about multiple patterns of transportation.
- Identity and explain several concepts related to the different patterns of transportation.
- Ask compelling and supporting questions to guide inquiry to further understanding of movement, population, and transportation.

INSTRUCTIONAL SEQUENCE

- 1. Before beginning the online activity, participate in a whole class discussion on traveling. Ask students places they have traveled before. How did they get there? What forms of transportation are there today? Why is transportation important or essential?
- 2. After having a short discussion, introduce to students that they will be looking at various maps online from the US Department of Transportation Map Gallery. Have students go to https://maps.bts.dot.gov/MapGallery/.
- 3. Before starting the activity, ask students why we use maps, what their function is, and why they are useful.
- 4. Walk students through a demo using the "Transportation Infrastructure of the United States: 2015" map available on the website. Make sure to use the map on the second page.
 - a. Ask students what they notice on the map.
 - b. Have students identify the features.
 - i. Key
 - ii. What each symbol represents
 - c. Inform students of the zoom in and out button.
 - d. Can they identify any patterns?
- 5. Once showing students using the demo map, pass out the handout activity that students will complete when exploring, analyzing, and looking for patterns of transportation within the maps. Go over the expectations for each student when completing the activity. Have students work in assigned groups of two, however each student should have their own copy of the handout to fill out.
- 6. After students are finished with the activity, host another whole-class discussion on their findings. Have each group of two share with the class what they discovered, what they thought was interesting, and what they still pounder about.
