| Explore critical digital literacy skills and evaluate content for accuracy and motive. Research the benefits of online communities and how to effectively navigate potential pitfalls in their digital lives. Formulate practical steps to protect privacy and safety online. Explore the knowledge and skills for the careers in the Computer Science, IT, and Technology pathways. | | |
| Gain an understanding of social and emotional learning. Explore communication skills, self-awareness, self-management, and careers in the human services field. 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| Beginning Band (year-long) | Students will choose either: Woodwind or Brass/Percussion Emphasis is on the acquisition of basic musical skills as students learn to play a brass, woodwind, or percussion instrument. Band classes prepare several concert compositions that are performed for an audience. Students should anticipate some after-school practices and evening performances. | | |
| Beginning Chorus | Students will develop proper singing techniques and explore musical expression through age-appropriate and historically significant vocal literature. They will learn to read traditional music notation and respond accurately to a conductor's gestures during rehearsals and performances. Additionally, students will study vocal music in relation to diverse cultures, historical periods, and geographical regions, fostering a deeper understanding of music's global and historical contexts. | | |
| Music Exploratory | Students are introduced to the skills necessary for singing and playing music with accuracy and expression while interpreting the sound and symbols of music. Through the study of various genres and cultures students will analyze, evaluate, and understand the music and concepts from other areas. | | |

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| Spanish Beginning Less than one year | This course is the first in a multi-course sequence for high school Level I credit. In this course, students will learn the foundations of the language's vocabulary and structures in order to communicate in simple, memorized, sentences related to basic necessary skills in the target language. Classes are conducted primarily in the target language with a strong focus on comprehensible input at a level appropriate for novice learners. Activities focus on students' abilities to perform in the interpersonal, interpretive, and presentational modes of communication. Students who successfully complete this course will demonstrate Novice Low proficiency. | |
