Course Text & Course Description:

This is an open-educational resources course and we will access course materials from the university library databases. We WILL NOT require students to purchase additional course books, etc. *The only item that you will have to pay for is the workbook.



Course Description: (3 Credits) - Course Description: (3 Credits) - This course is designed to improve the individual's understanding of the human communication process. Classroom exercises involve the student in interpersonal, small group, and presentational speaking situations. Special emphasis on developing communication skills needed to check and validate perceptions, control language usage, and analyze and improve reasoning processes.

- Understand the communication model and process.
- Understand the impact of culture on the communication process.
- Understand the listening process and apply good listening habits.
- Understand the impact of culture and context on selection of appropriate verbal communication.
- Be able to recognize cultural norms in nonverbal behavior.
- Be able to analyze and synthesize large amounts of information to produce relevant, insightful presentations.
- Be able to organize presentational information in a coherent manner.
- Be able to seek out information from a variety of sources.

B. Skill Outcomes

- Participate in partner assignment on designing a communication model based on a contextual situation.
- Observe and record poor listening habits in various contexts, and make suggestions for improvement based on good listening skills.
- Develop and participate in nonverbal and culture assignments in order to better understand the significance of cultural norms on nonverbal communication.
- Assist in the development of a course lexicon with emphasis on the improvement of vocabulary and language selection.
- Research, organize and present two presentations; one informative and one persuasive, utilizing a variety of supporting material and sources.

Requirements for Speeches/Assignments

- Late assignments will receive a 20 percent deduction on every subsequent day the assignment is late. For example, if a 50 point assignment is due on Wednesday and the student turns in the assignment on Thursday, the student can potentially earn 40 points.
- Speeches may only be delivered during the designated speech period on the class syllabus. Extenuating circumstances will be handled on an individual basis.
- Visual Aids (power point, youtube.com links, etc.) should be finished on Google Docs on the day BEFORE your speech is due. Any visual aids that are NOT finished by the day before your speeches will result in a 20 percent deduction. You MUST share your visual aid to Dr. Edwards via e-mail drjtedwards@gmail.com.
- Appropriate dress must be worn for speeches (please refer to the professional attire section).
- SPEECH SOURCES Students MUST use the library databases for each of their sources.
- Presentations must make the minimum time limit which is designated on the Speech Assignment sheets.

- Speeches must be given in an extemporaneous manner (i.e. must not be read directly from the note cards).
- Only use 3x5 note cards (written in outline form) when delivering speeches. This outline should not have complete sentences, except for evidence and quotes. Speeches should not be read from note cards).
- Professional Attire No jeans, shorts, or flip flops. The attire is business attire or business casual. Appropriate attire may include the following:
- Women suit, dress, khakis, dress pants, blouse, etc.
- Men suit, slacks, button-down shirt, tie, etc.

Use Canvas & Google Docs – Canvas will serve as Dr. Edwards's primary form of communication with the class with direct messages on Twitter. Speeches and Presentations

Dyad Informative Speech: The purpose of the informative speech is to introduce the audience to new concepts or to gain additional knowledge about an existing concept. At least six (6) sources from current literature are required for this speech. Students must verbally cite each source in this speech. (6-8 minutes) *Refer to iSpeak Learning Module

Group Persuasive Speech: The purpose of this speech is for students to persuade their classmates to change their way of thinking, take a certain action, or to purchase a particular product. At least eight (8) sources from current literature are required for this speech. Students must verbally cite each source in this speech. (12-15 minutes) *Refer to iSpeak Learning Module

Extra Credit – Various extra credit opportunities will be available throughout the semester. Current Events – Every student should remain informed of local, state, national, and international events. Many class discussions will be centered on current events.
