Letter from J.P. Morgan to Edward Clark, 1889. Clark was a newspaperman who was collecting funds to support the widow and children of Philip Welch, who died suddenly at age 40.

My dear sir, I have receipt of your note of the 15th and take pleasure in enclosing you herewith my check for \$250 [almost \$9,000 today] – as a subscription to the Philip H. Welch Memorial fund.

Trusting you may be able to complete the amount required..."
