

Superintendent update

- Budget Information- delay due to election
 - Election Day is April 16 (due to the provincial elections, the release of the budget is delayed)t
 - ➤ In the meantime, we will use this year's budget figures to plan for 2019-2020 school year. Adjustments can be made once the budget is announced.
- School Council Liaison with WCPS Board of Trustees April 9 at 6:30 p.m. Terrace Ridge, Lacombe
 - > The Board hosted the liaison meetings twice per year (typically fall and spring)
 - > Items for discussion:
 - o Two board advocacy items were shared in a tri-fold brochure
 - District results from the Thoughtexchange
- Jordan's Principle letter to support parents in Ponoka sector
 - > Jordan's principle (mechanism for gov't FNMI students who can't access resources)
 - o Superintendent will draft a letter to advocate and build awareness for families in need

Items for Discussion Barb Reaney, Director of Safe and Caring Schools, is currently working to develop a crisis response manual for WCPS. In doing so, she would appreciate feedback regarding a memorial table.

Question: Is it culturally appropriate to set up a memorial table when there is a death of a First Nations student?

Tania:

> Setting up a table is nice, but remember to take the student's picture down when appropriate. Other idea: make a cherish book to remember student and offer it to the family.

Leonard:

> Should get consent from the family out of respect. Grief is different for every person. In the old days it was a slow pace and everyone could grieve together. Now it is fast paced, it is hard to talk and see how people are feeling.

Veronica:

> This should also include non natives, ceremony in death is a good thing and allows closure for students. We make things tougher than it really is necessary. Perhaps consent in a form. Students tend to take on this role because they want to do something to start the grieving process...staff need to be cognizant of this to guide them.

Bert:

> It is appropriate to consent family about what type of ceremony. Remembering to balance out with today's world. Culturally, the picture is put away for a year. They honour the student by holding a celebration of life as it should be about healing not grieving. Carry on from that - that spirit is alive.

Gabrielle:

> Supports honouring the student.

■ Erin:

Supports learning and honouring the cultural ways.

Leanne:

> In agreement of setting up a table for any student. Like to see the healing part (smudges). Students spend more time with their peers than with their own family. Strong connections with students/staff. Ceremony/rituals: teaching about grieving as well. Cognizant of tears/tissue/display of picture, following process and protocol. We should have support for all students.

Josephine:

> In agreement with Veronica. Let the students decide what they want to do.

■ Lori:

> In agreement with Veronica. Amazing to see staff are their for students. There are ways to do things culturally so consult the family...but it is important to honour and celebrate the student. Doesn't hurt to ask the family...so students can grieve too.

■ Ian:

> What's common and normal for one is different for others. Need steps to do when you are incapacitated in a time of crisis.

CONSENSUS: Leave it generic and leave it up to the school and students. Compassion intervention.
