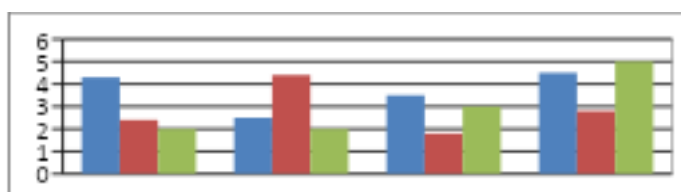


Fig. 1. Name of the picture
