# HDF 313 Module 2: Class Participation 2b: Puberty, Hormones, & Adolescence

This week we are learning about the biological changes that occur during adolescence. For this assignment you will watch some short videos and respond to questions about the videos.

## **Activity**

Puberty, Hormones, & Adolescence

## Purpose

The purpose of this assignment is to review changes that many people experience during puberty. Not everyone's experiences are the same, however, and some people may experience early- or late-onset puberty. For this assignment, you will watch a series of short videos about the biological changes that occur during puberty, such as the development of primary and secondary sex characteristics, and provide your answers to the prompts.

This assignment addresses the following Module Learning Outcomes:

- Describe the functions of hormones in the feedback loop of the endocrine system and how they initiate puberty.
- Identify the distinct aspects of physical and sexual development related to adolescence.
- Discuss concerns to adolescent health, wellness, and safety.
- Analyze the impact of cultural and environmental influences on physical and sexual development in adolescence.
- Examine cultural variations in the roles and importance of pubertal changes.

#### A NOTE ABOUT LANGUAGE:

You will notice that this lesson refers to "male" and "female" anatomy. These terms are used to refer to the sex a person was assigned at birth based, typically based on external anatomy (for example, a baby born with a vulva is likely to be assigned "girl"). At the same time, however, it is important to recognize that not all people's gender identities will match their sex assigned at birth.
