Substance Use Prevention and Education at Longmeadow Public Schools

"An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure."

Educating the whole child from the start is the first step to preventing substance use disorders later during adolescence. Students who feel connected to their school community are much less likely to engage in risky use. At LPS, we have numerous programs in place from K-12 that focus on SEL, or Social and Emotional Learning, as well as a **full time Substance Use Response Coordinator**, Shelly Warren. She assists with the development and implementation of tier 1 curriculum as well as tier 2 and 3 responses and interventions. Her <u>website</u> contains information about her role in the district and resources available to students and parents.

LPS supports the use of the CASEL Framework for Social and Emotional Learning.

- 1. **SELF-AWARENESS:** The ability to understand one's own emotions, thoughts, and values and how they influence behavior across contexts.
- 2. **SELF-MANAGEMENT:** The ability to manage one's emotions, thoughts, and behaviors effectively in different situations and to achieve goals and aspirations.
- 3. **SOCIAL AWARENESS:** The abilities to understand the perspectives of and empathize with others, including those from diverse backgrounds, cultures, & contexts.
- 4. **RELATIONSHIP SKILLS:** The abilities to establish and maintain healthy and supportive relationships and to effectively navigate settings with diverse individuals and groups.
- 5. **RESPONSIBLE DECISION-MAKING:** The abilities to make caring and constructive choices about personal behavior and social interactions across diverse situations.

Williams Middle and Glenbrook Middle Schools:

- Health Education for one trimester in Grades 6-8, including use of <u>Stanford REACH Lab Safety First</u> curriculum materials.
- <u>SBIRT</u> (Screening, Brief Intervention and Referral to Treatment), required by MA law, is completed for 7th grade students in the health office in collaboration with school counseling staff.
- Advisory Groups for all Middle School Students

Longmeadow High School:

- One semester of Health Education for all Grade 9 students, including units on alcohol and other drugs, personal wellness, mental health, inclusion and bullying and interpersonal relationships.
- <u>SBIRT</u> (Screening, Brief Intervention and Referral to Treatment), required by MA law, is completed for 9th grade students in the health office in collaboration with school counseling staff.
- One quarter of Health Education in all Grade 11 Wellness classes, including units on alcohol and other drugs, mental health and stress management, and sexual health.
- Recovery Panels in all senior Wellness classes. (In 2025 we featured Generation SOS.)
- Our Substance Use Response Coordinator utilizes the American Lung Association's InDepth Program,
 N.O.T. (Not on Tobacco), and Stanford REACH Lab's Healthy Futures to support students who are found to be using or possessing substances at school or school sponsored events.
- Special Programs supported by the Substance Use Response Coordinator.
